Digital Strategy

Review of all the actions in the Digital Strategy has been carried out in January 2021. All actions in the plan have momentum and activity from both Tipperary County Council and from our interagency partners in collaboration on its delivery.

These Connected Communities will provide an opportunity to transform the economic and social fabric of rural towns and communities by addressing the digital divide, improving lives, creating jobs and stimulating rural economic growth. Heather Humphreys T.D., Minister for Rural and Community Development congratulated Tipperary on their BCP network as part of the Connected Communities Initiative.



Leader and ETB have supported the purchase of equipment. BCPs were included in an application for funding under the Town & Village Accelerated Projects 2020 for the upgrade of the halls or items to improve conditions so it can accommodate people in a digital hub environment. Now that the BCP's are connected, work will commence to deliver programmes and other opportunities in partnership with STDC/NTDC/ETB and others.


Christmas Retail Support Programme 2020


A new site was established by Tipperary County Council https://shop.localtipperary.ie to support businesses that are capable of online retail services during COVID. This now has 600 business on display drawn from

This new site has the potential to become a service for further promotion of the Shop Local message in the future.




Review of Casual Trading / Markets Bye-Laws

It is expected that the consultation resulting in revised Bye-Laws will be completed in each MD in 2021.

Supporting Towns - Town & Village Accelerated Measures Funds 2020

Funding was awarded to Thurles, Tipperary and Carrick-on-Suir MD's for Town Centre Initatives to support the Retail Sector under the Town and Village Accelerated Measures 2020, including a new digital Hub by COSBA in Stable Lane), the development of a new Brand and Website for Tipperary Town was achieved.



County Marketing Campaign

New video testimonial content was created for Tipperary, The Place The Time (TTPTT) during 2020. Economic Development worked with successful Tipperary based companies to create this new content, including DMS Governance Cashel, FRS Roscrea, Fiserv Nenagh and Technopath Ballina. Our social media platforms for TTPTT were used to promote the videos, as well as a print media PR campaign.

A 2021 campaign has started and companies based in Clonmel, Cahir, Thurles and Carrick on Suir have been identified, and have agreed to come on board.

National Broadband Plan



Under the National Broadband Plan, Tipperary will see an investment of €118m in the new high-speed fibre network. Three (3) Core Network Areas are planned and located in the towns of Roscrea, Tipperary and Clonmel. NBi has already completed their Surveys of these exchange locations.

Commercial Investment in high-speed Fibre Broadband

SIRO, a joint venture of VODAFONE and the ESB, continues to deploy high speed broadband (FTTH) in the towns of Nenagh (3,700 premises), Clonmel (8,693 premises), Roscrea (2,800 premises).

Further SIRO investment in the County is planned to be announced in 2021.

In June 2019 **Eir ltd** commenced the build of its new FTTH investment Programme to upgrade its legacy copper network across the County. The footprint of the eir IFN Project will cover all urban areas in the county with greater than 1,000 urban premises (10 towns in the county)

Eir ltd recently completed its Urban fibre programme in Tipperary town in record time. A total of 3,000 premises were passed in 10 weeks. In addition, they have also passed 7, 900 premises in the following towns:

Nenagh,

Templemore,

Cahir.



Eir ltd – open eir also recently completed the deployment of high speed broadband FTTH to 16,000 rural premises in the National Broadband Plan Intervention area in County Tipperary under its Commitment Agreement with the State.

eNet had commenced the deployment of an open access fibre broadband Network in the town of Templemore. This project was subsequently suspended (project lambay suspension) given the Covid-19 Restrictions.

There are now over 133 Metropolitan Area Network Connection (s) across the eight (8) County Tipperary Urban eNet Networks and are either operational or in the process of coming on stream.



Their end users are a real mix of life in Business in the county made up of-

- Schools
- All of the larger FDI employers in these towns
- Bank Branches and Credit Union offices
- Supermarkets
- Gov Departments and State Agencies (Hospitals/Garda Stations etc)
- Other telecoms Infrastructure

Commercial Investment in Mobile Phone and Mobile Broadband

The Mobile Network Operators, including Vodafone, Three, Eir and Imagine (who provide for 4G LTE broadband and VOIP services) continue to build and upgrade networks in County Tipperary and this has led to significantly enhanced call and text reliability, 4G, 4G (plus) and 3G services.

Cellnex Telecom - who build

telecommunications Infrastructure - are now actively progressing circa 15 locations for new telecommunication infrastructure in County Tipperary. In the Portroe area / North Tipperary alone they are looking at solutions for the Terryglass, Carrigahorig, the N65 Portumna road, Puckane, Dromineer, Nenagh North and Silvermines as Phase One of their plan.

Phase One progressed in 2020 with Phase 2 beginning in early 2021.

Commercial Investment in high-speed Fixed Wireless Broadband

Imagine Broadband - who have been building an Fixed Wireless LTE Broadband Network in the County - since 2017

They have a total of 43,760 premises in the County which are now covered for broadband connectivity, which includes for 18,213 premises within the rural areas of the County.

In May, 2020 a new section of Imagine's Network was completed in the Nenagh Md covering 2,630 premises, this includes for 1,125 premises in the Amber area of the NBP.

High-Speed Broadband is now available in the following townlands Puckaun, Kevanstown, Coolbaun, Ballinderry, Terryglass, Portumna Bridge, Aglish, Borrisokane, Templemartin, Kildarby, Conger, Ardcroney and all townlands in between.

Future Technologies

The Telecommunications Industry has agreed to participate in the build of a pilot Shared underground Telecommunications
Infrastructure with Tipperary County Council and others to order to develop Future technologies and Smart Place telecommunications Infrastructure as part of the Liberty Square Refurbishment Project, Thurles, County Tipperary which plans to;

- a) develop a generic under-ground passive solution to Shared underground
 Telecommunications Infrastructure with Industry –
 The principle of active infrastructure sharing (will be subject to a code of practice) will also be developed.
- b) develop a future proof solution (infrastructure that is scalable, a long term investment that's fit for purpose)



WiFi4EU Initiative

Tipperary County Council has completed the installation of a fully supported Free Wi-Fi Network across an extensive Network of public Access Points, at designated locations (six (6) towns) in County Tipperary, under the European Commission WiFi4EU Programme and as match Funded by the DRCD.

Tipperary Destination Recovery Taskforce and New Resilience Plan

A Tipperary Destination Recovery Taskforce has been established to co-ordinate recovery at a destination level. The role of the taskforce is to agree actions with and between the stakeholders, identify and capitalise on opportunities as they arise over the next 12-18 months and to align destination marketing efforts with Irelands Ancient East and Irelands Hidden Heartlands and the Discover Ireland Marketing Campaign.

This new stakeholder group is led by Tipperary Tourism in co-operation with Failte Ireland and supported by Tipperary County Council. Stakeholders from across the industry and across the county are represented, working together to specifically address issues arising from Covid-19.

A workshop to develop a Tipperary Destination Resilience Plan is taking place on March 2nd to map out actions to support the industry over the next 12 months.

Collaboration and Communication

Tipperary County Council and Tipperary Tourism continues to collaborate with Fáilte Ireland and the Irelands Ancient East and Irelands Hidden Heartlands teams to develop and promote Tipperary as a tourism destination. In relation to Tipperary businesses, a closed Facebook group provides instant updates to businesses regarding topics of interest including financial supports, grants schemes, training and marketing initiatives. Furthermore bi weekly newsletters have issued detailing same.

Digital Training Directory

Following a survey of the industry in November, and subsequent discussion and alignment with the Local Enterprise Office, Tipperary Education and Training Board, Tipperary Skillnet and Fáilte Ireland a





comprehensive digital training directory has been developed and circulated to Tipperary Tourism members. It is also available on www.tipperary.com. Training opportunities are promoted through regular newsletters, the Tipperary Tourism Closed Facebook Group on a weekly basis and through Twitter.

Re-Imagining Tourism in Tipperary

As a direct tailored response to the digital training needs survey a new iteration of the Re-Imagining Tourism in Tipperary Programme will run for five weeks from March 15th. This programme was very popular in 2020 and provides an important communications platform directly with Tipperary Tourism members where their voices are heard first hand and their needs and concerns can be addressed.

Tipperary County Council wins Excellence in Local Government Supporting Tourism Award

Tipperary County Council has won a Chambers Ireland Excellence in Local Government Award in the Supporting Tourism category for Suir Blueway Tipperary. This is a much-coveted award with strong competition from five other shortlisted local authorities. This win cements Tipperary's reputation as a tourism destination offering excellence in visitor experience development, and specifically showcases the fine attributes of Suir Blueway Tipperary, providing another vehicle through which to promote Tipperary as a tourism destination.

Visit Fethard Town & Village Funding

The community in Fethard secured funding to prepare a Visit Fethard campaign to roll out in line with the reopening of tourism businesses in 2021. This project, supported by Tipperary County Council, will see the development of a new audio trail, web presence and digital and video content for Fethard leveraging off Tipperary Tourism and Irelands Ancient East brands. This project

will integrate with the historic town's heritage trail upgrade and The Butler Trail APP.

Holycross Visitor Experience

Tipperary County Council continues to support the community in Holycross to scope the possibility of developing a new visitor experience close to Holycross Abbey. To date the OPW and Fáilte Ireland have noted their support of this scoping exercise.

Just Transition Funding for Littleton Labyrinth.

Tipperary County Council in partnership with Bórd na Mona has been successful in a recent funding application to the Just Transition Fund for €780,000 to develop the first phase of Littleton Labyrinth, essentially this project encompasses a peatway from Horse and Jockey to Glengoole encircling Lough Daoire Bhile. Included in this project is a feasibility and business plan to develop the concept of a Bushcraft Survival and Activity Centre first mooted in the Tipperary Transforming, Tourism Product Development Plan 2020-2030.

Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme

The following Measure 1 Applications have received funding under the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme 2020. €166, 000 in total has been awarded to Tipperary County Council.

New Tourism APP

Funding of €30,000 has been secured under the Town and Village Renewal Accelerated Measures Grants Scheme to develop a new tourism APP, the APP will initially focus on Suir Blueway Tipperary and is expected to develop over time into an all county tourism APP complementing www.tipperary.com and significantly enhancing the Tipperary Tourisms digital presence.

Tipperary Transforming, Tourism Product Development Plan 2020-2030 Launch & Cashel Destination Town Plan Update

Plans are currently progressing to host an industry briefing for Tipperary Tourism members to formally launch the Tipperary Transforming Plan and to provide an update on the Cashel Destination Town Plan. This event will present details of the Tipperary Destination Recovery Taskforce, planned marketing activities for 2021 and act as a launch event for the Tipperary Tourism Membership Scheme 2021.

LEADER Application

The LEADER application for marketing services 2021 has been approved with funding of €57,937 awarded, 50% from South Tipperary Development Company and 50% from Tipperary County Council. The funding awarded will assist Tipperary Tourism's marketing actions in the year ahead.

Interactive Map: ORIS funding received to create an interactive digital map to showcase outdoor activities around the county.

Marketing 2021 Campaign

Mini-Campaign: A level 5 marketing campaign underway, as a soft-sell reminder to consider Tipperary when planning for holidays later in the year.

Main Campaign: The 2021 Marking Campaign for Tipperary will be "The Insider **Tipp",** this aligns perfectly with Failte Irelands Keep Discovering campaign. New content around outdoor activities will be created and shared on traditional media, radio, social media and podcasts.

Failte Ireland Covid 19 Safety Charter – to ensure as many Tipperary businesses as possible sign up for the Covid 19 Safety Charter, 112 businesses signed up to date.

Asset Sharing Almost two terabytes of footage was gathered around the county in 2020.

Regional Press and Radio -the 2021 campaign will have a focused local intercounty campaign to encourage travelling and shopping locally.

Lough Derg

Lough Derg Visitor Experience Development Plan, The Lough Derg VEDP & Screening documents, were adopted by the Lough Derg Marketing Group on December 2nd. It is envisaged this plan will be launched in March 2021.

Discovery Points LEADER funding has been awarded to create visitor focused discovery points at locations around the lake, this project will commence on March 1st.

A **Destination Recovery Taskforce** was established for Lough Derg in July 2021. A Destination Resilience Plan was developed for 2021. Four key areas of focus were highlighted as follows:

 The Lough Derg Challenge: 12 weekly challenges, each week a new challenge which will appeal to a different market segment, data will be captured on an app. The purpose is to invite visitors to partake in an activity in their own



- time, thus avoiding mass gatherings. This challenge will be co-sponsored by Ireland's Hidden Heartlands.
- Create a Lough Derg Evening experience: Develop five new destination wide experiences focused on evening outdoor entertainment.
 E.g. Night-kayaking, night swimming, evening hikes.
- PR: Develop a P.R. calendar focused on seasonal occasions, the Lough Derg Challenge and innovative packages.
- Best in class Visitor Information and Packaging. Develop an online brochure and itineraries.

Marketing: In 2020 an innovative marketing plan was executed, including P.R., podcast sponsorship with Blindboy, Radio and local press media. As a result of this awareness Lough Derg reported a significant increase in followership and website traffic in 2020. Digital audiences across all social media more than doubled in the last 12 months, and 8 million impressions were created. A new digital marketing plan will be implemented in 2021.

Interactive Map: ORIS funding was applied for and received to create an interactive digital map to showcase Blueway activities on and around Lough Derg.

T.V. Filming completed on the River Shannon for a feature on **Channel 5 (U.K. T.V.)** on the most scenic rivers in the world; broadcasting date in March to be confirmed.

Nationwide In talks with nationwide about a feature on Lough Derg wildlife for filming in Q2 2021.

Content: A 7-day shoot took place on Lough Derg sponsored by the ORIS and IHH in September 2020. One hero video and nine mini-videos have been created for use in the 2021 campaign. Eight terabytes of footages

have been sub-clipped and made available on Vimeo, for business around the lake to use in their marketing. Also available for use is over 1,000 images, which have been catalogued and uploaded to Flickr, with inspirational written pieces.

Photography: A talented photographer has been commissioned to capture content for 50 social media posts to be circulated throughout 2021.

Training: A bespoke training programme for tourism businesses to help them use this new content will be organised, administered and promoted.

Trade Communications: A monthly newsletter will be circulated to the tourism sector around Lough Derg, detailing: Training

Munster Vales

Munster Vales Strategic Development Plan:

The Munster Vales Strategic Development Plan 2020-2025 was launched in November to a virtual audience of 100 people. Chairperson Pat Slattery described how the plan aligned with the Council's Community & Economic Development goals in further developing and sustaining the wellbeing of our communities through economic development and enterprise development for tourism related businesses, community engagement and further developing the cultural and recreational areas.

Community Engagement Program:

This program is funded by LEADER and meets the demand of the communities in this region to gain a greater understanding of the role that tourism can play in the communities and to enhance the relationships between



agencies, community groups and tourism related businesses. There are 40 people participating in this course from the Galtee and Knockmealdown region.

Suir Blueway Tipperary

In partnership with Tipperary County Council we are exploring the possibility of a feasibility study to link Suir Blueway Tipperary with Waterford Greenway.

Funding

Leader funding has been approved in principle for Covid Support and marketing for rural tourism businesses and communities. ORIS Measure 1 funding received for two projects. 1) Development of a Digital Interactive Map 2) The rollout of a Slow Adventure Campaign

Marketing:

A new digital marketing strategy has been implemented with emphasis on supporting tourism related businesses through the pandemic and further engaging with the domestic target market through interactive and brand recognition campaigns.

Public Awareness

Household Waste Pre-Tenancy Training



The section is working with the Housing Section to highlight to new households their responsibilities regarding household waste management. Staff carried out Pre-Tenancy training with 17 tenants by telephone and sent them information packs on the services at the civic amenity sites, recycling and ways of reducing food waste.

Repair Directory



The section received funding from the Environmental Protection Agency in 2020 of €3,500 to compile a Repair & Reuse Directory of service providers available in Tipperary that offer a repair and reuse service as part of waste prevention initiative. This aims to encourage people to repair or reuse items rather than throw them away. 1,000 Repair and Reuse Directory booklets were published, and they

will be available to the public through the libraries, Civic Offices, Municipal Districts Offices, Resource Centres and Citizens Information Centres. A competition will be held to promote the directory.



Dog Licences Awareness



To increase the number of dogs licenced, 4,000 leaflets were distributed to households in the Cahir area in January, advising them of their obligations to licence their dogs.

Dog Fouling Awareness Campaign



A pilot campaign to raise dog fouling awareness is planned for Tipperary Town and Thurles. Hi Vis jackets will be distributed to the public and these can be obtained from SuperValu shops in Tipperary Town and Thurles from mid-March. Depending on the success of the pilot, it is intended to roll out this programme to other Municipal District areas in April and May.

Community Services

Dogs

There were 1,069 Dog Licences purchased during this period. 28 dogs were impounded, with 15 rehomed and 5 reclaimed.

The number of horse queries processed to date is 6, with 2 horses seized.

The Civic Amenity Sites are currently developing a grey water collection system, which will enable the sites to collect rain water and reuse it for washing the facilities, thus reducing the amount of metered water used on site. Works have begun on installing newly purchased compaction equipment at the Roscrea Civic Amenity, to be followed by installation at the Nenagh Civic Amenity.



Derelict Sites

In 2021, one property has been added to the derelict site register and two properties were removed, having been rendered no longer derelict. An updated copy of the register was published on our website on 15/02/2021. Derelict Site Levies for 2021 have issued to the relevant owners. The section continues to engage with owners in relation to their properties, although current Government restrictions prevent any works being carried out.

Waste Management and Enforcement

Glass, Cans & Textile Recycling

3,962 Tonnes of glass and 146 tonnes of cans were collected from the 113 Bottle/Can bring locations in 2020. This represents an increase of just over 1,000 tonnes (35%) of glass from 2019, mainly due to Covid-19. This presented many challenges, such as the glass collectors' capacity to take in the increased tonnage and also the demand for glass cullet has dropped significantly due to many sectors being closed, such as the construction industry, which uses glass cullet for sand blasting. 2020 saw an increased focus on signage and CCTV operations at our bring bank locations, which has resulted in a notable drop in illegal dumping at these locations. Stickers were placed on every bottle bank in the county, promoting awareness on how to dispose of glass and cans correctly and the contact numbers for reporting overflowing bring banks.

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New Skips



The Section has purchased 17 new skips, along with 4 new waste compactors, at a cost of €169,115.65. These new skips and compactors will be based in Nenagh and Roscrea Civic Amenity Sites. These skips are part of the plan to manage and improve the waste contracting services at the civic amenity sites.

Textile Recycling

In May 2020, Tipperary County Council organised the placement of clothes bank receptacles at each of our bottle bank locations. This resulted in the collection of 247 tonnes of textiles for recycling in the eight-month period. The items were recycled and re-used in a number of different industries. Some were sold overseas as clothing and items which were of a lower quality were recycled into cloths/rags for the motor industry or used as furniture filling.

Household Waste Inspections

17 surveys were carried out by correspondence due to Covid-19 restrictions. 10 of these households were compliant and 7 were requested to provide evidence to demonstrate compliance.

Environmental Protection

Air Pollution

Live information on Air Quality in Clonmel, Tipperary Town & Nenagh can be retrieved at EPA website www.airquality.ie. The status of the air in all towns is rated as good and is compliant with the CAFE directive. A Traffic emission study undertaken in Thurles and Tipperary Town will be ready for reporting in April. This data will be shared with the EPA for publishing.

Water Pollution / Agriculture

Planned Inspections were restricted in this period. All Pollution incidents were investigated as per HSE guidelines. Activities undertaken to date include:

Approx. 150 River samples were taken as part of the WFD sampling program across the county. 12 water pollution incidents occurred, were inspected and appropriate corrective action taken

10 Farm inspections were completed in response to pollution incidents

1 Section 12 Notice has been issued and 1 Warning letter issued in response to Water Pollution risk.

7 Nutrient Management Plans were submitted and assessed.

A project identifying Farms with derogations and high nitrates usage level has been undertaken to further assist in our water quality management remit.

Engagement with LAWPRO is ongoing and the section made a presentation on Water Quality challenges associated with Agricultural intensification at the Regional Operational Committee meeting

Planning Referrals

27 Environmental Reports on Planning application were submitted to the Planning Section to ensure potential environment impacts of proposed developments are identified and mitigated at planning stage.

Projects Planned

The Section is participating in the Department of Agriculture Food & the Marine led Creation of Woodlands Scheme, to identify publicly owned lands for the planting of native trees as part of the Climate Action Plan. This will further enhance air quality, while providing improved natural amenities in Tipperary. The continuation of a survey of established car dealers to assist in the identification of rogue deco paint traders. This was undertaken in 1 MD in 2020.

IRISH WATER INVESTMENT PLAN 2020-2024:

Irish Water has submitted its Third Interim Revenue Control proposal (known as IRC3) to the Commission for the Regulation of Utilities (CRU) for the period from 01 January 2020 to 31 December 2024. This incorporates Irish Water's Investment Plan for the period 2020-2024. The CRU's determination on this proposal was made with the publication of its Decision Paper on 05 December 2019, entitled *Irish Water Revenue Control Revenue Control 3 (2020-2024)*.

This Decision Paper was issued against the backdrop of the new funding model for Irish Water brought about by:

- the Water Services Act 2017;
- the publication by Mr. Eoghan Murphy, TD, the then Minister for Housing, Planning and Local Government, of the Water Services Policy Statement on 21 May 2018, and
- his approval of Irish Water's Strategic Funding Plan 2019-2024 on 08 November 2018.

The Decision Paper was accompanied by Irish Water's Updated Investment Plan 2020-2024, entitled *Irish Water Investment Plan 2020 to 2024 Updated Investment Plan for CRU Review*, submitted by Irish Water in November 2019 to the CRU for review.

In April 2020 Irish Water submitted a further capital funding request to the CRU, which was reviewed in its entirety by the CRU. Having considered this request, the CRU, on 04 August 2020, published its Decision Paper entitled *Update to Irish Water's Revenue Control 3 (RC3.5) - Irish Water's Updated Capital Investment Plan.* This Decision Paper took into account evidence related to commitment dates for projects that Irish Water plans to deliver in the period and information provided by a review of Irish Water's capital planning processes by Scottish Water International.

The Update sets out the total revenue that Irish Water can receive, through government subvention and from customers, to cover its efficiently covered costs during the period 2020-2024. This Decision Paper should be read in conjunction with the aforementioned Decision Paper published on 05 December 2019.

Further details on this economic regulatory control process may be gleaned from a perusal of the website of the CRU, <u>www.cru.ie</u>.

Investment is prioritised where it can deliver the most urgently needed improvements in drinking water quality, leakage, water availability, wastewater compliance, efficiencies and customer service.

The table hereunder provides an update of the current status of capital projects in County Tipperary.

In 2020, Irish Water restructured the delivery of the Investment Plan into three streams, as follows:

- (1) Water Portfolio includes all projects and programmes relating to water treatment plants, water quality, trunk watermains, reservoirs, energy efficiency and dam safety;
- (2) Wastewater Portfolio includes all projects and programmes relating to wastewater treatment, sludge management, trunk networks and drainage area plans; and
- (3) Networks Portfolio includes leakage reduction programme, water networks regional contracts, growth and development programmes and sewer rehabilitation.

The above table lists those projects in County Tipperary which form part of the water and wastewater portfolios.

In respect of the Capital Delivery element of the Investment Plan, these ongoing programmes are designed to prioritise spending as effectively as possible, by identifying where funding is most needed through a focus on specific asset condition and performance, identifying root causes of problems and addressing these.

The programme addresses issues such as:

- water quality;
- water availability;
- health and safety;
- environmental regulatory compliance (per the Environmental Protection Agency);
- public health and environmental risk;
- energy efficiency; and
- maintaining levels of service through addressing underperforming assets.

All projects put forward by Tipperary County Council are reviewed by Irish Water before approval.

As part of Capital Delivery, projects are underway in County Tipperary under a number of headings. The following update describes the current position on a number of these projects in relation to water and wastewater.

(A) <u>NETWORKS PORTFOLIO DELIVERY (WATER):</u>

Irish Water has established a new contractor framework to replace the existing frameworks and has appointed Shareridge Limited to the Mid-West Region which covers Counties Tipperary, Limerick and Clare.

The scope of services covered by this framework includes the following:

- new watermains and service laying;
- below ground network rehabilitation work;
- backyard lead replacement;
- District Metering Areas (DMA) establishment;
- pressure reducing valves (PRV) works; and
- minor works to include leak repair, public side lead works and metering.



(1) Watermains Rehabilitation Works:

- 1) Proposed 2021 works: Ardfinnan (1km); Mount Carmel and St. Anne's Terrace, Ardfinnan (0.2km); Davis Road, Clonmel (0.48km); Kilfeacle to Thomastown (0.8km); and Templetuohy (0.15km).
- 2) Back Yard Services replacement ongoing at Tipperary:

The project began with Phase 1 works to replace 220 number lead shared services in the following locations: Marian Terrace, Saint Michael's Avenue, Cashel Road, O'Connell Road, Dillon Street, Saint Patrick's Avenue and Dawson Villas. This phase of works is the first to be approved of the planned 3 phases which, subject to Irish Water approval, aim to progress the removal of almost 1,000 back yard lead services from the water supply in Tipperary.

The process of transferring the water supply from the rear to the front of each dwelling is a slow procedure which will require engagement and agreement with all the properties affected. It is planned that the removal of all the back yard services will add to the quality and sustainability of the water supply to Tipperary and reduce leakage, in a major way, in the old lead and cast-iron pipes.

- 3) Back yard services replacement (32 no.) in Mount Carmel and St. Anne's Terrace, Ardfinnan to start in 2021.
- 4) First Fix programme is ongoing.

(2) National Disinfection Programme:

Irish Water is undertaking a National Disinfection Programme. This Programme will:

- improve drinking water quality;
- ensure compliance with the European Union (Drinking Water) Regulations 2014, as amended;
- remove supplies from the Remedial Action List (RAL) as maintained by the Environmental Protection Agency;
- reduce the risk of the issue of Boil Water Notices or the formation of trihalomethanes (THM); and
- provide improved control of the disinfection systems.

The Disinfection Programme will be carried out in 2 phases:

Phase 1: Water Treatment Plant Assessment:

This stage involves the assessment of the condition and performance of the existing disinfection systems at water treatment plants across the country. This will determine the works required to ensure that the treatment plant disinfection process meets the specified requirements.

Phase 2: Necessary Upgrade Works:

Some of these works may include upgrade of chemical storage and dosing infrastructure, upgrade of ultraviolet (UV) disinfection systems, upgrade of monitoring systems and generation of Critical Process Alarms.

The following update describes current progress on the National Disinfection Programme in County Tipperary in respect of Phase 2 Necessary Upgrade Works at various locations throughout the county:





- (i) Works ongoing at Lingaun Coalbrook, Cordangan, Crotty's Lake and Stooke.
- (ii) Design to start at Hollyford, Dualla, Riverstown, Lorrha, Coolbawn (Nenagh), Newport and Borrisokane.

(B) NETWORKS PORTFOLIO DELIVERY (WASTEWATER):

Irish Water has appointed AECOM (Project Management) and Terra Solutions contractor to carry out sewer network rehabilitation works as part of regional sewer rehabilitation projects. The scope of works within each regional contract will be defined gradually through inputs from Water Services engineers, closed circuit television (CCTV) surveys, etc., to identify and prioritise asset upgrade requirements.

No start date has been indicated by Irish Water.

Foul sewer rehabilitation works took place at Father Sheehy Terrace, Clogheen and at Market Place, Clonmel during November to December 2020.

(1) Wastewater Inlet Works, Storm Tank and Sludge Programme:

Irish Water has procured J.B. Barry and Partners Limited as Engineering Consultants to assess a number of wastewater treatment plant sites to assess if the provision of new inlet works, storm tank, sludge treatment (or combination of these) would be worth progressing to improve plant operation. The sites identified are Borrisokane, Kilsheelan, Holycross and Limerick Junction. A preliminary design review is ongoing. The provision of any identified works will require a prior grant of permission from Tipperary County Council as planning authority.

(2) Flow Monitoring and Sampling Programme:

A Flow Monitoring and Sampling Programme is underway at a number of wastewater treatment plants throughout the county.

(3) Provision of Chemical Bulk Storage Tanks:

The provision of chemical (ferric sulphate/chloride) bulk storage tanks is planned for a number of wastewater treatment plants throughout the county.

(4) Small Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvement Programme:

Under the Small Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvement Programme, the wastewater treatment plant at Carrick Street, Mullinahone was identified for improvement works. A grant of permission issued to Irish Water by Tipperary County Council, as planning authority, on 25 September 2018 to upgrade the wastewater treatment plant, to include construction of inlet works, new process units and below ground storage tanks, landscaping and associated ancillary works including new below ground pump chambers and pipework.

The documentation submitted by Irish Water with the planning application indicated that the population equivalent of the agglomeration of Mullinahone is 608. Consequently, it is in receipt of a licence from the Environmental Protection Agency.

The above works are substantially complete; however, redesign of the settlement tanks is ongoing and it is expected to be constructed in Q1 2021.





(5) National Certificate of Authorisation Programme:

Wastewater treatment plants which serve an agglomeration where the population equivalent is less than 500 are in receipt of a Certificate of Authorisation from the Environmental Protection Agency as the environmental regulator. Those plants serving a population equivalent in excess of this threshold are in receipt of a licence from the environmental regulator.

Irish Water has a National Certificate of Authorisation Programme (NCAP). Pursuant to this programme, feasibility studies and site investigations are underway in relation to a number of wastewater treatment plants throughout the county which are in receipt of the said certificate of authorisation.

(6) Wastewater Pumping Station Programme:

Consultants appointed by IW are currently assessing a number of wastewater pumping stations to improve pumping station operations. The consultants have produced draft concept design reports for pumping stations at Borrisokane Park; Riverstown, Birr; Murroe Road, Newport; Riverside, Ballina; and Killenure, Knockavilla. These will be reviewed at Irish Water workshops.

CONCLUSION:

It should be noted that progression of the above projects is dependent on Irish Water and on the availability of the resources necessary to deliver same. Engagement by Water Services with Irish Water is ongoing in respect of the above.

IRISH WATER NATIONAL WATER RESOURCES PLAN:

The Irish Water National Water Resources Plan (NWRP) is Ireland's first 25-year strategic plan enabling us to move towards safe, secure, reliable and sustainable water supplies for all of Irish Water's customers and communities, whilst safeguarding public health and the environment.

Irish Water published its Draft Framework Plan, the first phase of its National Water Resources Plan, for public consultation.

The NWRP aims to safeguard public health, facilitate growth and meet the challenges of climate change over the next 25 years.

For the first time, the NWRP will provide a country-wide analysis to identify the water we have, the water we use, the water we need and any potential risk to water quality. It sets out the methods and options to meet these shortfalls in a resilient and environmentally sustainable way and is accompanied by a Strategic Environmental Assessment Environmental Report and a Natura Impact Statement, which looks at how the Plan considers its impact on the environment.

The NWRP will:

- calculate the demand for water from homes, businesses and industry now and into the future;
- assess the amount of water available in existing supplies;
- assess the impact of weather events such as drought on our water supplies; and
- identify areas where there is not enough water supply to meet demand, or where there is a risk to water quality.

A 10-week public consultation sought feedback on the Irish Water NWRP Draft Framework Plan and associated environmental reports from 08 December 2020 until 16 February 2021, which date was



extended to 01 March 2021. Following this consultation period Irish Water will finalise and adopt the Framework Plan and commence the Phase 2 development of four Regional Water Resources Plans which will set out the options to address identified needs across all of Irish Water's supplies. Irish Water will be again seeking the public's views as each of the Regional Plans will be subject to public consultation.

IRISH WATER SMALL TOWNS AND VILLAGES PROGRAMME:

Irish Water's Revenue Control 3 (RC3) Investment Plan 2020-2024 includes the Small Towns and Villages Programme (STVGP). This programme is primarily intended to provide capacity in wastewater treatment plants to cater for growth in smaller settlements which would not otherwise be provided for in the current Investment Plan. The STVGP is limited to supporting growth in settlements already served by Irish Water infrastructure.

On 27 July 2020 Irish Water notified Tipperary County Council that 7 settlements in County Tipperary had been identified for inclusion in the STVGP. These are: Cloughjordan, Golden, Holycross, Kilsheelan, Lisvarrinane, Newcastle and Silvermines.

Tipperary County Council has submitted supporting information in relation to these settlements and a workshop for Planning and Water Services staff took place with Irish Water on 11 November 2020 to discuss the above settlements, possible solutions and cost estimates.

Final decisions on which projects progress will be made by Irish Water. At that stage, Tipperary County Council will be notified of the successful project(s) which will then be progressed as per Irish Water's capital investment delivery processes. It is anticipated that Tipperary County Council will be notified of successful projects on a staggered basis from Q1 2021 as project details are agreed.

NON-DOMESTIC WATER CHARGES:

On 03 July 2019 the CRU published its Decision on Irish Water's Non-Domestic Tariff Framework. The purpose of the framework is to generate a harmonized suite of tariffs for non-domestic water and wastewater customers. A harmonized approach will benefit Irish Water's customers in terms of transparency, simplicity and equity. The framework sets out the "rules" for how tariffs are designed and how customers will be transitioned to their new tariffs over time, as well as the new non-domestic tariff rates.

This framework of charges will replace the existing charges, which had been set by each local authority prior to 01 January 2014. The new charges will be on a national basis, i.e. there will be no local variation and they will have a fixed and a variable element. Existing billing frequencies will remain as they are until Irish Water carries out a review. Details of the new charges are provided at https://www.cru.ie/for-business/billing-explained/charges/ and an executive summary is available at https://www.cru.ie/cru-publishes-decision-on-new-tariffs-for-irish-waters-non-domestic-customers/.

The new non-domestic charges were to take effect on 01 May 2020 but have been deferred. The CRU, in conjunction with the then Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government and Irish Water, announced on 31 March 2020 that they had agreed to approve Irish Water's proposals to defer the implementation of the new non-domestic tariff framework for business customers, in recognition of the potential financial difficulty for non-domestic customers over the coming months. In 02 November 2020 the CRU announced a revised date of 01 May 2021 for the new set of national water and wastewater business charges to come into effect.



The CRU website states: The CRU felt that any further delays would limit the positive benefit to smaller business customers who will experience a bill decrease under the new arrangements. The new tariffs encourage water conservation and will mean lower bills for many businesses forced to use less water due to COVID-19 restrictions, as the new tariffs will lead to bills that better reflect their reduced water consumption.

COUNCIL WORKSHOP WITH IRISH WATER:

Workshops with Irish Water for the elected members have taken place at the Civic Offices, Thurles on 27 October 2017, 12 April 2018, 02 October 2018, 03 April 2019 and on 30 September 2019.

The most recent workshops have been conducted on a District basis during the period from 28 September 2020 to 06 October 2020, with remote connection by representatives from Irish Water and the facility for remote connection by the elected members also.

Water Services is currently engaging with Irish Water in relation to the format of future workshops with the elected members. As Irish Water is considering this matter at present, further details are not available.

RURAL WATER PROGRAMME:

The Rural Water Programme principally covers the following:

- (i) group water schemes; and
- (ii) group sewerage schemes, the provision of which requires the active participation of the householders concerned.

The focus of the Rural Water Programme for 2021 in respect of group water schemes is to address remaining inadequacies in the quality of drinking water so as to ensure compliance with the priorities set down in the European Union (Drinking Water) Regulations 2014, as amended, through:

- (i) the provision of treatment and disinfection facilities;
- (ii) source protection measures; and
- (iii) the rehabilitation and upgrade of distribution systems.

The unprecedented national circumstances occasioned by the COVID-19 pandemic paused much of the civil works activity with the result that progress has been slow. With social distancing requirements it has been impossible to hold meetings required for the scheme amalgamation and rationalisation process. A number of group water schemes are meeting digitally; however, it is a challenge.

Progress on the above programme of work was reviewed by the Rural Water Committee at its meeting at Civic Offices, Nenagh, on 21 October 2020, with some members in attendance by remote connection. The meeting scheduled for 12 January 2021 was postponed and it is anticipated that the meeting will be held, by Zoom, in March 2021.

Capital Grants for Group Water Schemes:

Tipperary's average annual investment via capital grant is €500,000 with capital grant payments at €528,047.35 as at 31 December 2020.

The Rural Water Team within Water Services recognises the commitment of the group water scheme sector in progressing capital projects to the extent of this expenditure, given the difficulties arising from having to comply with public health measures, such as construction work paused and difficulties encountered meeting group water schemes, and engineering and other personnel involved in driving these projects.



The larger projects during 2020 were as follows:

- Rahealty-Clobanna Group Water Scheme: civil works contract to be completed in February 2021 (snag list to be attended to);
- Gurteenakilla-Plunkett Street Group Water Scheme: completed its snag list for an interconnection pipe;
- Ardcroney-Frolic-Luska Group Water Scheme: new source under investigation;
- Abbeyville-Lorrha Group Water Scheme: watermain upgrade and source protection carried out; and
- Consulting Engineer's Report: eTendering exercise to be carried out shortly to procure the services of
 a consulting engineer in relation to a process of amalgamation and rationalisation of group water
 schemes in County Tipperary:

Phase 1: Preliminary Report; and

Phase 2: Design and Contracts.

27 group water schemes have returned statements noting their agreement to become involved, with varying degrees of enthusiasm. Engagement with the Rural Water Unit in the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage (DHLGH) is ongoing in relation to this process.

It is expected that the DHLGH will invite Tipperary County Council to gather projects for consideration under the Multi Annual Rural Water Programme 2022-2024 in Q3, 2021. Requests for watermain improvement funding must be accompanied by supporting documentation (step testing, analysis of unaccounted for water (UFW) and display that one is addressing the point where most water is being lost as distinct from the area with most leakage points).

Annual Maintenance Subsidy for Group Water Schemes:

Annual Maintenance Subsidy (AMS) payments, in 2020 amounted to €580,175.54 distributed over 69 group water schemes. This is the first year Tipperary County Council has had an application for Advance Annual Maintenance Subsidy, payment of which (€4,365) is included in the total payments. An Advance AMS can be paid where a group water scheme is experiencing financial issues. It is calculated at 70% of the previous year's AMS. The invitation to apply for AMS was posted to 72 group water schemes on 26 January 2021.

The Rural Water Team within Water Services continues to work with all group water schemes and with the National Federation of Group Water Schemes to ensure that schemes' reliance on this Advance AMS is minimised.

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic the Rural Water Team within Water Services has been in contact with group water schemes accepting electronic submissions and responding electronically where possible. Group water schemes are allowed to submit claims despite being unable to hold an annual general meeting and where it has not been possible to present audited accounts to members at an annual general meeting. Such schemes are to ensure that, at the earliest opportunity, annual general meetings and presentations take place. This year the DHLGH has set a closing date of 01 October 2021 for receipt of recoupment claims from Tipperary County Council. Requests for payments to group water schemes after that date cannot be recouped until 2022.

Alia:

The Rural Water Programme also covers the following grant schemes and expenditure on these grants is recoupable from the DHLGH::

grants payable pursuant to the Housing (Private Water Supply Financial Assistance) Regulations 2020 for the provision or necessary improvement of an individual water supply to a house (known as well grants);





- (b) grants payable pursuant to the Domestic Wastewater Treatment Systems (Financial Assistance) Regulations 2013, which Regulations have been superseded by the:
 - (i) the Housing (Domestic Waste Water Treatment Systems Financial Assistance) Regulations 2020;
 - (ii) the Housing (Domestic Waste Water Treatment Systems Financial Assistance for Prioritised Areas for Action) Regulations 2020; and
 - (iii) the Housing (Domestic Waste Water Treatment Systems Financial Assistance for High Status Objective Catchment Areas) Regulations 2020

(known as septic tank grants);

and

(c) grants payable pursuant to the Domestic Lead Remediation (Financial Assistance) Regulations 2016 (known as lead piping grants).

It should be noted that the assessment of the applications under the grant schemes at (b) above, including site inspections, are carried out by the Environment and Climate Action Section.

Further details on these schemes follow:

Revised Private Well Grant:

A revised Private Well Grant Scheme is now in place and operating from 05 June 2020.

Conditions are largely unchanged and the Scheme is still demand-led. The Scheme has an appeal system built into it. There are 3 headings under which an application may be made:

Treatment: installing an ultra-violet (UV) system, pre-filter system, iron or manganese,

etc. filter:

100% of approved costs, subject to a maximum grant of €1,000.

Upgrade: New pump, pressure vessel, structure and electrics of pump house:

85% of approved costs, subject to a maximum grant of €3,000.

New source: drilling, dressing, sealing well head:

85% of approved costs, subject to a maximum grant of €5,000.

An applicant can apply under any of these headings or combinations as follows:

Treatment and Upgrade or Treatment and New Source.

An applicant **cannot** apply for both New Source and Upgrade.

On 15 January, 2021, the DHLGH introduced a cut-off date of 30 March 2021 in respect of the former private well grant scheme. 87 applicants awarded since 2014 have been contacted to get in touch with the Rural Water Team within Water Services without delay. All work, documents, site visits and payment to the applicant and recoupment from the DHLGH must be completed by 30 March 2021. 54 applicants have responded. Where work has not started one may withdraw and apply under the revised scheme bringing one's award with one. Where work has started there is no choice but to continue on the former scheme and ensure that all elements, as outlined above, are completed by 30 March 2021. Every effort is



being made to support and assist all these applicants. An extension to this cut-off date of 30 March 2021 has been sought from the DHLGH.

As at 19 February 2021, 16 applications were received with 10 grant approvals issued.

Septic Tank Grants (Domestic Wastewater Treatment Systems):

No applications have been received in 2021 to date.

The Domestic Wastewater Treatment System Grant Scheme has also been revised. There are now 3 headings under which an application can be considered. Technically, the conditions are unchanged. The income limit has been removed. The maximum grant payable has increased from €4,000 to 85% of eligible costs or €5,000 whichever is the lesser figure.

Each of the following is a separate scheme and an applicant cannot be assisted under a combination of these schemes. Each scheme requires the applicant to have registered the domestic wastewater treatment system with *Protect our Water* by 01 February 2013; where the dwelling was erected after that date, the applicant must have registered within 90 days of connecting to the domestic wastewater treatment system.

Each scheme requires that the home is the applicant's principal place of residence (not applicable to holiday homes, for example). Each scheme has an appeal system built into it.

(a) DWWTS National Inspection Plan:

This is the most similar scheme to the former scheme with virtually no change in conditions under which an applicant qualifies and an increased maximum payable. This is not demand-led. The Environmental Protection Agency notifies Tipperary County Council of the areas where inspections can be carried out and the number of inspections to be carried out annually. Only those homeowners inspected can be considered for assistance under this scheme.

(b) DWWTS Prioritised Areas for Action (PAA):

The River Basin Management Plan for Ireland 2018-2021 outlined Prioritised Areas for Action nationwide. The Local Authority Waters Programme (LAWPRO) promotes the scheme in Prioritised Areas for Action, identifying homes where domestic wastewater treatment systems may be a risk to water quality and notifying the homeowner in writing. This enables the homeowner to apply to Tipperary County Council to be considered under the DWWTS PAA Scheme. Receiving such a letter does not mean the homeowner must apply for a grant and carry out improvement



works. Neither will this be used in enforcement proceedings. It is the homeowner's decision to pursue an application and works under the DWWTS PAA Scheme.

To apply for consideration, the homeowner forwards a completed application form, the LAWPRO letter along with a scope of works put together by a competent person, to Tipperary County Council. Staff from the Environment and Climate Action Section carry out a site visit to verify the application for qualification purposes and the scope of works outlined by the competent person on behalf of the applicant. The applicant is advised in writing as to eligibility for the scheme and can proceed with eligible works. Once work is complete a second site visit is carried out by staff from the Environment and Climate Action Section. Where all is in order, the file proceeds to payment.

(c) DWWTS High Status Objective Catchment Area:

Potential applicants satisfy themselves that their home is within a High Status Objective Catchment Area (there is an interactive map online), then submit an application form and a scope of works prepared by a competent person, to Tipperary County Council. The Council carries out a site visit verifying whether or not this application is eligible for consideration. The homeowner is notified in writing of eligibility (or not). Where eligible, the applicant can proceed with having work carried out, which is followed by an eventual post-works site visit and processing of payment.

Lead Piping Grants:

One application has been received as at 19 February 2021 and is under consideration.

WATER SECTOR TRANSFORMATION:

On 23 February 2021 Deputy Darragh O'Brien, Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage published a Policy Paper on Water Sector Transformation entitled *Water Sector Transformation Policy Paper: Irish Water – Towards a National, Publicly-Owned, Regulated, Water Services Utility.* The Policy Paper, Frequently Raised Topics, and accompanying press release, are available on www.gov.ie/housing. All new publications appear on the homepage under the Publications heading with the press release appearing under the Press releases heading.

The Policy Paper:

- sets out the Government's vision for the future of water services;
- addresses the provision of water services as set out in the Programme for Government, entitled *Our Shared Future*, published on 15 June 2020;
- considers the water sector transformation process; and
- concludes by requiring the key stakeholders to engage to agree a framework to move towards an integrated public water services utility.

Further developments are awaited.

Housing Delivery

The Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government identified a Target of 625 Social Housing Units to be delivered by Tipperary County Council in conjunction with the Approved Housing Bodies for the period 2018-2021 as part of Rebuilding Ireland, through Build, Acquisition, and Long Term Leasing. This is in addition to separate HAP and RAS targets.

In the period 2018-2020 657 units of accommodation have been provided in Tipperary or 105% of the target with 12 months of the timeline remaining. Covid has had an impact on delivery across the country with construction stopped for a period in 2020 and again from 11th January 2021 to date with the exception of sites where delivery can be achieved up to 30th April 2021. This is a recent derogation - previously it had applied to sites with delivery by 28th February 2021. 4 such sites were designated as essential sites in Tipperary namely, Cloughjordan, Knockanrawley, Mitchel Street and more recently Templetuohy for a phased delivery.





The 2018-2021 Housing delivery programme continues to be rolled out with:

- Construction works on site at 11 locations providing 169 dwellings
- A further 35 dwellings with the Contractor Appointed at 3 locations
- 4 schemes at Tender Stage providing 59 dwellings
- 2 schemes advertised for Part 8 providing 13 dwellings
- 86 dwellings in the early stages of the 4 Stage Approval Process

Syrian Refugee Resettlement Project

Tipperary County Council is housing 45 families in 2020/2021 as part of Ireland's international commitments arising from the humanitarian crisis in Syria. In 2019 an interagency steering group was established to assist the resettlement process and a scoping exercise was undertaken to determine the most appropriate locations to house the families. Arising from this work, four locations were identified (Nenagh, Templemore, Tipperary Town, and Clonmel). Youth Work Ireland (Tipperary) has been appointed as the implementation partner for this project. They will provide resettlement assistance for an eighteen month period and establish a support structure for the families once the project is completed. The resettlement process has begun with 25 families settled in Clonmel, Nenagh, Templemore and Tipperary Town The remaining 20 families will be welcomed to Tipperary in the early months of 2021.

Energy Efficiency

The Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage has allocated €1.277 million to Tipperary County Council

for the retrofitting of a minimum 47 local authority-owned houses in the county. After the works, the Building Energy Ratings (BER) of homes will typically be B2. They will be expected to be substantially cheaper to heat than similar homes heated by oil or gas.

The works are part of the Midlands Retrofit Programme and funded by the Carbon Tax. Works will typically involve insulation, upgrades of windows and doors and installation of heat pumps (renewable energy heating systems), as committed to under the Programme for Government. This will help Ireland's efforts to combat climate change. About 40% of Ireland's energy-related carbon emissions are from buildings. The works are broken into 3 phases with 2 phases tendered to date and the third phase is being surveyed. It is anticipated that works will commence in Q2 2021 and be completed by the end of Q3 2021.

Housing Grants

The Council received a total allocation of €3,246,170 in 2020 for Private Housing Adaptation Grants of which €649,234 was to be provided from Tipperary County Council's own revenue resources. The Council has not yet received confirmation of the 2021 allocation.



The Council received a total allocation of €534,812.83 for Local Authority DPG's in September 2020 but got final approval for €583,040.51. All Local Authorities are allowed to spend up to 65% of their previous year's allocation pending receipt of their full 2021 allocation in order to progress works throughout the year.

Applicants who are seeking a grant for roof insulation, wall insulation, boiler and heating control upgrades, solar panels, etc ,should

contact the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) - Tel: 1850 927000 for more information, as these works are not available under the Housing Grants Schemes.

Homelessness

In line with government policy, the focus of the Homeless Team has been on the prevention of clients entering emergency accommodation and thus the homeless cycle with the use of private rented accommodation with the aid of HAP as the primary option for homeless clients. The Homeless Prevention Officers working in tandem with the HAP Place finder Service have been very successful in achieving this aim. Please find set out here under the figures for homeless presentations for 2020 which indicates a 56% success rate

for the prevention of clients entering emergency accommodation. In monetary terms this has seen a reduction in expenditure on emergency accommodation from €736,000 in 2019 to €435,000 in 2020 which represents a 59% reduction.

It is envisaged that there will be a continued reduction on the dependency on emergency B&B accommodation as the Council is



considering the introduction in 2021 of its Own Front Door Service for emergency accommodation. Under this service the Council will provide three units of accommodation to be managed by Focus Ireland for use as emergency accommodation.

There is currently only 1 client in long term emergency accommodation i.e. in excess of 6 months and he is to be housed under the Housing First programme shortly.

THE HAP Place Finder Service has contributed to the success in this area by the creation of 179 Homeless HAP tenancies since its introduction. This success continues as evidenced in January 2021, 12 potential homeless clients have sourced HAP accommodation with the aid of the service.

Given the success of the HAP Placefinder in the south of the County, the Council has sought approval from the Department to appoint a second HAP Placefinder for the north of the County and is awaiting confirmation of same

The multi disciplined Homeless Action Team continues to provide a forum whereby a care and case management approach is adopted to put in place an exit strategy for each client who needs emergency accommodation whether with support from HAP, Approved Housing Bodies, RAS or Council housing. A sub allocation team has been established to identify the most suitable housing option for those in emergency accommodation.

Under the Housing First model introduced in the south of the county in 2020, 12 units of accommodation were to be provided for the most vulnerable of approved housing applicants. To date 11 units have been provided and it is hoped that the final unit will be in place shortly. The model is successful in that we have 11 of our most complex cases in secure accommodation with wrap around services ensuring that they maintain their tenancy.

A Submission is now with the Department seeking to extend this service to the north of the county and expand the service in the south of the County.

The START programme, a 2 year pilot initiative in the south of the County, supports persons at risk of becoming homeless due to significant mental health challenges. To date we have accommodated 6 such clients. They are provided with wrap around mental health services to ensure that they are able to maintain their tenancy. A similar support service is provided by a North Tipperary Intensive Support programme in the north of the county and the Council is currently engaged with this programme to ascertain how it could be mainstreamed.

The Tenancy Sustainment Service which has a county wide remit (with the recent appointment of a TSS to the Nenagh office) provides support for 41 LA tenants who need help in sustaining their tenancy ensuring that they remain in their accommodation that is suitable to their needs. In addition, the TSS service has taken on a number of Traveller family units to help them sustain their current tenancy.



The Council will continue to work with other mainstream service providers to maximise the supports that can be provided to the most vulnerable of our clients and provide them with every opportunity to have access to a safe home.

for the Repair & Lease scheme, providing additional social housing options. Buy and Renew can target the purchase of both disused and older vacant homes and assist in the improvement of derelict and disused areas within our villages and towns. The level of support with the Repair and Lease Scheme has recently increased to €60,000 and we are actively seeking a greater take up as a result in 2021

Buy and Renew

The Buy and Renew scheme is designed to support local authorities (and approved housing bodies) to purchase and renew vacant housing units in need of remediation and make them available for social housing. It is a companion strategy

Rebuilding Ireland Home Loan

The Rebuilding Ireland home loan is a Government backed mortgage which was introduced on 1st February 2018. You can borrow 90% of the market value of the property to a maximum of €250,000 in Tipperary. This loan offers two rate products 2.745% fixed for up to 25 years and 2.995% fixed for up to 30 years.

Traveller Accommodation Programme

Tipperary County Council's Traveller Accommodation Programme, following consultation with traveller agency groups outlines the accommodation requirements of the Travelling Community over a five year period from 2019 to 2024. To date the targets set out in the plan have been met for 2019 and 2020 the Council is aiming to provide 25 units of standard accommodation for traveller families in 2021.

In addition the Council intends to provide a caretaking service for group housing/halting sites in the south of the county and it is envisaged this will be in place by Quarter 2 2021.

The Council is also obliged to prepare a 3 Year Capital Programme and the current Programme covers the period 2020 to 2022. This Programme provides for upgrade works, new build, site remedial works, etc. so as to improve the living conditions of the travelling community.

Please find hereunder the proposed Capital Works for 2021 and the current position in relation to each project.
