





#### ROAD SAFETY

Visits have resumed to schools, family resource centres and other interested facilities with the Virtual Reality (VR) headsets provided by Aviva Driving School. The first visit, which took place on 18<sup>th</sup> October, was to the Mill Family Resource Centre in Urlingford. The VR sets show what is happening in a particular car in the build up to a Road Traffic Collision. It also shows the aftermath of the collision. It is very useful for young drivers and those who are about to start to drive in the next year or two.

Meetings of the Collision Prevention Team and the Road Safety Working Together Group took place in October. All the stakeholders are actively engaging to complete the 75 actions contained in the Tipperary Road Safety Strategy Action Plan 2022-2024. Below are, samples of adverts promoting road safety.





#### **VELOCITY PATCHING FLEET**

Tipperary County Council has taken delivery of a new velocity patching machine manufactured by Archway Products Ltd, one of three new machines purchased since 2020. The cost of the velocity patcher was partially funded by a grant from the Department of Transport amounting to €100,000, being 33% of the total cost. The addition of these vehicles, which will be deployed across the road network county-wide, to the Council's Road Maintenance fleet, introduces a comprehensive and modern approach to road maintenance. The velocity patcher is a one-man operated machine that delivers a computer calibrated mixture of aggregate and binder directly into the pothole or road defect under high velocity ensuring a cost effective, reliable solution to problematic road maintenance issues.

The new machines complement an existing fleet of six older velocity patchers, the oldest being a 2002 machine that was one of the first built by the manufacturer Archway Products Ltd, in Carrick-on-Shannon, County Leitrim.

On receiving the keys to the new velocity patcher, Joe MacGrath, Chief Executive said "Our continuous advancement towards modernising our works programme delivery is greatly benefitted by the purchase of these new vehicles over the past three years. Velocity patchers also provide a much safer work environment for our operatives. I wish to acknowledge our suppliers, Archway Roadmaster, on the timely delivery of this vehicle. I have great pleasure in launching this vehicle into the Council's fleet, which will be operated by one person and do a faster and better job than previous methods."

Tipperary Council's Fleet of 9 Velocity Patchers and Drivers

#### HEDGE CUTTING

The 2023/2024 Hedge cutting Season commenced on 1 September 2023 and runs through to 29 February 2024. All landowners and occupiers of land are requested to note that Section 46 of the Wildlife (Amendment) Act, 2000 prohibits the cutting, burning or destruction of any vegetation growing on uncultivated land or in a hedge or ditch during the period 1 March to 31 August each year. This is to ensure the safety of birds and other wildlife.

Tipperary County Council would like to thank owners and occupiers of land adjoining roads who inspect trees and hedges on their property during the hedge cutting season and ensure that they do not pose a danger to road users. Examples of hazards include dead or dying trees, ditches or hedges interfering with traffic, blocking footpaths, obscuring road signs, public lighting or road users' visibility. Tipperary County Council requests the co-operation of the public in keeping road users safe. A public awareness campaign commenced in September and will continue throughout the hedgecutting season. The Council's District offices will be carrying out local inspections and notices will be issued as necessary to relevant landowners.

#### PUBLIC LIGHTING

A new Public Lighting policy was adopted by the Council in December 2022. Public lighting queries are dealt with daily by the Roads Section, the Customer Service Desk and the Municipal/Borough Districts. Enerveo is notified of the relevant queries and corrective action is taken as appropriate. Tipperary County Council has responsibility for the management and maintenance of more than 18,000 lights in the county and public lighting is the biggest user of energy in the Council's overall energy usage.

Tipperary County Council is participating in the National Public Lighting Energy Efficiency Project (PLEEP) which will see 11,600 lights upgraded to LED across Tipperary. This project is being rolled out on a regional basis with Tipperary County Council included in the Eastern region. Kilkenny County Council is leading the project in the region. Tipperary County Council continues to engage with the lead partner to ensure successful delivery of the project. The contractor appointed to carry out this work has completed surveying all existing streetlights and lighting designs will commence in early 2024.

#### **EV CHARGING**

EasyGo, in partnership with *eir*, and working with Tipperary County Council are progressing with the installation of Electric Vehicle Chargers across Tipperary which will see the company investing €600,000 into the county. This involves the installation of thirteen new fast electric vehicle (EV) charging stations in County Tipperary, providing 24 charging points.

*eir* and EasyGo have joined forces to develop new charging points across the country, to accommodate the growing number of EVs on our roads. Electric vehicles accounted for 24% of all new cars sold between January and March 2023 - surpassing diesel car sales for the first time. Installing these chargers in easily accessible town centre locations will increase the appeal of EVs for drivers, greatly extending the accessibility of charging points and thus the range of the vehicles. Transport accounts for one-third of Ireland's energy-related CO2 emissions so increased adoption of EVs is a key aspect of Ireland's Climate Action Plan.

The EV chargers are at various stages of being installed in: Ballina, Borrisokane, Cahir, Carrick-on-Suir, Cashel, Clonmel, Fethard, Nenagh, Newport, Roscrea, Templemore, Thurles & Tipperary Town. Installation of chargers commenced in June and it will take a few months to have these rapid chargers installed and operational. These installations mark the continuation of the rollout of this programme nationally. Throughout this programme, **EasyGo** and *eir* will utilise Tritium's world-first, nextgeneration simultaneous DC Rapid Chargers, adding up to 100km range to an Electric Vehicle in just 15 minutes.


#### <u>SALTING ROUTES –</u> <u>WINTER MAINTENANCE 2023-2024</u>

The winter maintenance period lasts from mid-October to the end of April each year. Tipperary County Council is constantly striving to improve its winter maintenance service; however, neither the local authority nor Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) (formerly the NRA) has a statutory obligation to pre-salt roads. Having regard to the Council's resources in terms of finance, equipment and staffing levels and to maximise benefit to road users, winter maintenance of roads in Tipperary is prioritised on the following basis:

- Priority 1: M7 Motorway, M8 Motorway, National Roads, and Regional Roads of strategic importance, e.g. Expressway Bus routes, access to Train and Bus Depots, Hospitals, Ambulance routes, and Fire Stations.
- Priority 2: Regional Roads with high volume of traffic using the road and access to major schools and industries
- Priority 3: Other regional roads, town streets and local county roads on a priority basis.
- (In extreme weather events Priority 1 routes will take precedence over Priority 2 routes in terms of allocation of available resources). The Council has quid pro quo agreements with Waterford, Offaly and Kilkenny

County Councils to treat routes in each other's areas to increase efficiency of the treatment routes.

- The Council has a total capacity of approximately 3,880 tonnes in its salt storage facilities, which is sufficient to treat a 5-day snow event.
- Twelve crews are rostered to pre-salt Priority 1 and Priority 2 Routes (approx. 1,010km) before the onset of icy conditions. These spreaders can have snowblades fitted in the event of snow. It is common for a variance in road temperatures to occur across the county, which may result in only some of the routes being pre-treated on any particular night.
- In the event of dangerous road conditions i.e. black ice, white frost, snow, flooding, muck or any other hazardous road condition, the responsibility is on the driver to drive at an appropriate speed with due care in accordance with prevailing conditions on the road.
- Tipperary County Council is not responsible for any accidents that may occur as a result of poor driving conditions.

#### **URDF Call 3**

URDF Call 3 seeks to tackle long term vacant and derelict buildings and sites across URDF towns and cities primarily in order to accelerate the provision of residential development and regenerate town centres. An allocation of €5m has been approved for Tipperary County Council under this Call and €1m of this allocation has been paid in advance to assist with early activity under an approved acquisition programme in the URDF designated towns of Clonmel, Nenagh and Thurles.

#### **PLANNING SECTION**

#### Local Area Plans for Clonmel, Nenagh, Thurles and Roscrea

With the Tipperary County Development Plan 2022-2028 now in place, progress on the preparation of Local Area Plans (LAPs) for the Key Towns and District Towns in the County is well advanced. The Tipperary County Development Plan 2022-2028 sets out a Core Strategy for the development of towns and villages in the County. The plan sets out the character, potential and vision for growth as demonstrated in the Town Profile Plan for Key and District Towns which will inform the preparation of a new Local Area Plan.



The Planning Section commenced the development of the Roscrea, Clonmel, Nenagh and Thurles LAPs in Autumn 2022 and have been developing each of the LAPs through the different stages of the process for adopting the Plans since that time.

In September 2023, elected members decided to make the Roscrea Local Area Plan 2024-2030. This Plan came into effect on 23 October 2023, replacing the Roscrea Local Area Plan 2012.

Draft LAPs were published on 28 July for the Clonmel, Nenagh and Thurles LAPs and the public display period ended on 11 September. 117 submissions were received on the Draft Clonmel LAP, 37 submissions on the Draft Nenagh LAP, and 27 submissions on the Draft Thurles LAP. Chief Executive Reports were prepared for each of the LAPs and provided to elected members, summarising each of the submissions received, and providing recommendations on addressing each of the submissions. On 27 October 2023, members decided to amend the Draft LAPs for each town in accordance with the recommendations of the Chief Executive Reports, with some minor additional amendments in the case of the Thurles LAP.

Proposed Material Alterations (PMA) to each of the three LAPs were published on Friday 17 November, with consultations closing on Monday, 18 December 2023 at 4pm. This is the final stage of public consultation. Chief Executives Reports will be prepared on the submissions received in the PMA stage, and provided to Elected Members in mid-January 2024. Workshops will be provided for elected members of each respective municipal district in January and February to discuss the relevant CE report in advance of the plenary meeting on 12 February 2024. A decision whether to make the Local Area Plans will be made at a plenary meeting in February. If a decision is made to make the Local Area Plans, the Plans will have effect on 25 March 2024, and will replace the respective Town Developments Plans currently in place for each of the towns.

#### **Residential Zoned Land Tax**

As set out in Housing Policy Objective 15.2 of Housing for All, a new tax to activate land for residential purposes, and which will in time replace the Vacant Site Levy, has been introduced by the Department of Finance and the Revenue Commissioners in conjunction with the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage as a Land Activation Measure.

The Residential Zoned Land Tax provisions of the Finance Act 2021 set out criteria to facilitate the identification of lands which fall within the scope of the tax. The Planning Authority are responsible for preparing and publishing maps based on this criteria. These maps are to be based on the local authority development plan and where relevant, local area plan zoning maps i.e. where land is zoned and suitable for residential development. The legislation also sets out certain lands which are to be excluded from the scope of the tax.

All land that was zoned for residential development, or residential development and a mix of other uses, in a development plan or local area plan, before 1 January 2022 and which remains subject to the relevant zoning on that date, is liable for consideration within the initial scope of the Residential Zoned Land Tax. This is intended to encourage activation of existing planning permissions on lands which are identified as being in scope and to incentivise suitable lands without planning permission to commence the process of engagement with planning authorities.



Draft maps were published on November 1st 2022 and were subject to a consultation period until January 1st 2023. A total of 91 submissions were received. These submissions have been reviewed, and where necessary, a referral to statutory consultees and internal sections of Tipperary County Council, was issued, requesting information to assist with determinations of submissions. A formal determination / decision, where necessary, was required to be notified to the landowner by 1st April 2023. 62no. notifications of determinations were issued by Tipperary County Council.

Landowners, to whom determinations were notified, had a right to appeal the determination to An Bord Pleanála by 1st May 2023. Tipperary County Council has been notified by An Bord Pleanála of 18 no. appeals received. On request, the planning section sent background documentation, which informed the determinations, to An Bord Pleanála. An Bord Pleanála must make a decision not later than 16 weeks from date of receipt of the appeal. Determinations have been made by ABP on these appeals (16 upheld and 2 reversed)

In addition, a further review and assessment has been undertaken to identify any additional sites that come into scope for the tax, being sites which may have been missed during the draft stage. These sites have been included on a Supplemental Map, which was published on 1st May 2023, and on which submissions could be made not later than 1st June 2023. 1no. submission was received on the Supplemental Map from a landowner requesting exclusion of a site on Tivoli Road, Clonmel. This submission was reviewed and a referral to statutory consultees and internal sections of Tipperary County Council, was issued, requesting information to assist with a determination.

A formal determination / decision by Tipperary County Council on this submission was notified to the landowner by 1st August 2023. The landowner has a right to appeal the local authority's determination to An Bord Pleanála by 1st Sep 2023. An Bord Pleanála must make a decision not later than 16 weeks from date of receipt of an appeal, if made.

A Final Map will be published on 1st December 2023, taking account of determinations and appeal decisions made on Draft and Supplemental Map submissions, and any other relevant changes including changes on foot of the annual Uisce Éireann's WWTP capacity register and zoning changes that come into effect prior to 1st Nov 2023, most notably the new Roscrea LAP 2023-2029. The Final Maps will be published on the TCC website (https://www.tipperarycoco.ie/rzlt) on 1<sup>st</sup> December 2023.

Workshops were held with the Elected Members on 30th January and 24th May 2023. A presentation was given to the Planning SPC on 13th June 2023 and 12<sup>th</sup> September 2023.

It was announced in Budget 2024 that the RZLT has been deferred by 1 year. The tax was due to take effect from 1 February 2024. This means that the first liability date will instead be 1 February 2025 and will be charged annually from 1 February 2025 onwards (subject to the passing of Finance (No.2) Bill 2023).

#### Town Centre First (TCF) / Town Regeneration Officer (TRO)

Tipperary County Council was awarded funding earlier this year of €100,000 to deliver a Town Centre First Plan for Roscrea Town. The funding has been awarded under the Department of Rural and Community Affair's "Our Rural Future", Ireland's Rural Development Policy 2021-2025. The plan will help to develop Roscrea's own unique vision and plan for its future development and once complete, will provide a basis for the town to seek support from multiple funding streams, including the Rural Regeneration Development Fund, (RRDF) and the Town & Village Renewal Schemes. A Town Regeneration Officer was appointed in November by Tipperary County Council and will initially work



with Roscrea as the first pilot town in the County to have a TCF plan developed. The first steps will be to establish a Town Team for Roscrea for which expressions of interest were received as part of a public consultation process during the summer. A contract will be awarded shortly to appoint consultants to support the delivery of the Town Centre First Plan with the TRO and a timeframe for completion has been set for the summer of 2023.

#### Urban and Rural Regeneration and Development Fund: Project Implementation

The National Development Plan (NDP) 2018-2027 established four new funds to help drive the specific core priorities detailed in the NPF (National Planning Framework). These four funds included an Urban Regeneration and Development Fund administered by the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government and the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund administered by the Department of Rural and Community Development. The following projects are currently being delivered.

**Clonmel 2030 Transformational Regeneration** seeks to develop a multi-dimensional, public/private/community partnership proposal for Clonmel, which will re-imagine how civic, cultural, educational, enterprise and tourism uses can work together to regenerate and create a new role for

the town. The project includes four intrinsically linked and integrated pillars, namely: Kickham Barracks Regeneration, Clonmel Regional Sports Hub, Clonmel – Flights of Discovery and Clonmel Public Realm Enhancement. Funding was received for proposed Category A works in 2019 relating to Kickham Barracks Regeneration Phase 1 and Clonmel Regional Sports Hub. Both elements of the project are completed. **Total project costs approved are €15,163,247 and URDF grant awarded is €10,594,961.**


Liberty Square Enhancement Scheme, Thurles seeks to deliver a vibrant Liberty Square at the heart of Thurles: a place to live, shop, work, socialise, play or "hang-out". The revitalised Liberty Square will become an engine for growth in and around Liberty Square and will enhance the attractiveness of Thurles as a place to live and a place for investment / employment. Funding was received in 2019 to undertake works to the Eastern end of Liberty Square and to develop a new car park off Liberty Square. Additional funding of €1m was secured in March, 2021 to undertake enhancement works to the Western end of Liberty Square and the junctions of the approach roads. Phase 1 works are fully completed. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of Phase 2 of this



# project is ongoing. Total project costs approved are €10,700,291 and URDF grant awarded amounts to €5,390,291.

A Pathway to a Low-Carbon Society: A Centre of Excellence for Sustainable Energy driving the transformational urban regeneration of Nenagh: -The proposal is to develop a Centre of Excellence for Sustainable Energy, to be the anchor and catalyst for the redevelopment of Martyr's Road Regeneration Quarter, a 10 ha. strategic site of brownfield lands and underutilised properties located in the heart of Nenagh Town Centre. The Centre of Excellence, taking reference from best international practice, will uniquely host a range of public agencies working collaboratively to deliver innovative solutions from training and development, to new cutting-edge research on technologies, to incubating low-carbon social enterprises. The Centre has been designed to be Ireland's first carbon neutral and energy positive building. The works to be supported also include Public Realm and Amenity Enhancement to Friar Street Civic Plaza, Martyr's Road Town Park, Martyr's Road streetscape improvements, including cycleways. Funding was approved in March, 2021 under the Second Call for funding support from the Urban Regeneration Development Fund. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. Total project costs approved are €12,700,000 and URDF grant awarded amounts to €9,525,000.

**Tipperary Town Regeneration** - This is a significant regeneration project for Tipperary Town which will greatly enhance long term sustainable tourism for the area. It includes: Upgrade of the Market Yard as a pedestrian priority area linking the Excel Heritage Centre to Market Yard and the Town Centre; Development of an 800m gravelled walkway parallel with the existing river channel and connecting to the existing path near Glenview; Installation of a new pedestrian bridge to access the walkway from the Link Road. Funding was approved in 2018 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. All elements of this project are completed. **Total project costs approved are €1,442,018 and RRDF grant amounts to €1,081,513.00.**

#### Fethard Town Park

The project consisted of the development of a community sport and recreational campus, incorporating a community pavilion, playing pitches, walkways, parkland and open spaces. The project was developed through a partnership approach with Coolmore Ireland, Cashel and Emly Diocese and Healthy Ireland. Funding was approved in 2019 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. This project was completed in early April, 2023 and opened to the public on 8<sup>th</sup>. April. The official opening was undertaken by Minister Heather Humphreys on Sunday, 18<sup>th</sup>. June, 2023. Phases 1 and 2b groundworks and pitches together with the stand and community annex of the pavilion were funded by the Magnier Foundation (Coolmore Ireland). **Total project costs for Phase 2A Pavilion and Public Realm Works amounted to €3,145,927 and RRDF grant amounted to €3,003,445.**

#### Templemore Town Hall Enterprise and Cultural Centre with Civic Plaza

The project proposal is a flagship urban regeneration project to conserve and establish Templemore Town Hall as an economic, cultural and community hub of the town, the District and the Mid-West Region. The project was prepared by the Council in partnership with Garda Training College, Templemore College of Further Education, Templemore Community Development Association, the Local Enterprise Office and the Tipperary Energy Agency. Funding was approved in 2019 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total project costs approved are €4,014,746 and RRDF grant amounts to €3,011,060.**

#### Nenagh Historic & Cultural Quarter - A Tourism-led Regeneration Plan

It comprises a Plan to regenerate specific existing buildings and civic spaces of distinction and value within Nenagh (including The Gaol, The Castle and Banba Square) to stimulate tourism growth and revitalise the local economy/visitor economy within a context of tourism-led regeneration, comprising arts, history, heritage and culture. The focus will be on the development of 3 Flagship Pillars and 3 Supporting Pillars, collectively offering an immersive tourism experience. Funding was approved in 2020 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total project costs approved are €896,712 and RRDF grant amounts to €672,534.**

#### **Carrick on Suir Regeneration Plan - Category 2 Project**

Plan for the town, through investment in orientation and public realm enhancement actions, to build on its relationship and synergies with the Suir Blueway (west) and the historic Ormond Castle Quarter (east) and thereby regenerate the town centre as an immersive visitor destination and rural town in its own right. Funding was approved in 2020 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. This Category 2 project is completed. **Total project costs approved are €487,500 and RRDF grant amounts to €365,625.**

# A Pathway to the Regeneration of Cahir Town Centre: Re-establishing the Historic Square as the Living-Working Quarter

A suite of measures that will re-vitalise Cahir's historic Square as a living-working quarter. The project will provide a dynamic town centre Square with a focus on pedestrian priority and civic space. The redevelopment will be focused around Market House, a flagship Business Development Centre based in one of the most historic buildings on the Square. Funding was approved in 2020 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. This category 2 project is completed. **Total project costs approved are €986,354 and RRDF grant amounts to €663,362.**

**Thurles Market Quarter: Regeneration through Recreation, Education and support for Local Producers** is a collaboration between Tipperary County Council, Thurles Lion's Club and Mary Immaculate College Thurles. The project will provide a designated market space in the town centre

for local food and craft producers, artists and performers; will offer a location in the centre of a cluster of civic spaces to be enjoyed by locals and visitors while also acting as a base for the MIC Students' Union. The project was awarded RRDF Funding in April, 2021. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total project costs are €3,825,700 and RRDF grant amounts to €3,443,130.** 





**Kilsheelan – Revitalisation of Rural Villages: A Model for Cluster Housing and Low Carbon Planning** The project has been developed as a demonstrator scheme to show the practical implementation of



Tipperary County Council's **'Design and Best Practice Guidelines for Cluster Housing'.** The guidelines include a series of case studies illustrating how sustainable design solutions can be developed across a range of village types and site options. This project will be model for serviced site developments across the Country and an initiative to revitalise villages in Tipperary and nationally. The scheme at Kilsheelan was subject to a Part 8 process and approved by the Elected Members in July, 2019. The project also includes the development of a new public park in the heart of this picturesque village and a new arrival point for the River Suir Blueway. The project was awarded

RRDF Funding in April, 2021. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total project costs are €670,833 and RRDF grant amount is €603,750.** 

#### **Rialto Digital & Enterprise Hub, Nenagh**

Funding has been approved to prepare detailed designs and planning for the adaptive re-use of the former iconic 1940's Rialto cinema into a modern digital and enterprise hub facility using best practice and appropriate modern architectural intervention to provide excellent office, collaboration and meeting spaces. The associated brownfield site will be master-planned to explore the potential for further digital and enterprise office space, the creation of a new streetscape along Emmet Place, the potential provision of town centre residential units and the delivery of a new public amenity heart in the town centre. The Hub will be an exemplar sustainable, green, town centre regeneration project that will revitalize the town centre of Nenagh through the provision of much needed incubator enterprise space, public realm enhancement, improved permeability/linkages with existing streets and backland/infill development through planning for the delivery of town centre homes. The overarching aim and purpose of the proposal is to promote economic development and increase employment opportunities while preserving and saving a protected historic structure which was purchased by the Council in December,2020. The project was awarded RRDF Funding in January, 2022. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total project costs are €1,511,059 and RRDF grant amounts to €1,208,847.**

# Carrick-on-Suir Regeneration Plan - 'A Journey from the Suir Blueway to the Ormond Castle Quarter - Delivering Our Community's Ambition'

This project follows on from the successful Category 2 RRDF application for the planning and design of extensive public realm enhancements in the town centre, development of Suir Blueway linkages and the regeneration of the Ormond Castle Quarter. Improvements will consist of (i) the transformation of Main Street, Sean Kelly Square, Greystone Street, Ball Alley Street and Chapel Street through the installation of high-quality public realm; (ii) provision of a new Enterprise and Digital Hub in a vacant town centre building owned by An Post on Main Street which will be managed and operated by Carrick on Suir Tourism and Economic Development Committee; (iii) the creation of an arrival point at Sean Healy Park through design, enhancment and orientation measures practice in user needs for kayakers, cyclists, walkers and other users and the integration of the Suir Blueway Tipperary into the town centre through the creation of shared spaces integratingbest along the Quays and linkages to Main Street.; (iv) public realm upgrade of Castle Street and repurposing of Ormond

Castle Park as a high-quality Amenity and Biodiversity Park. Funding was announced by Minister Heather Humphreys under Phase 1 on 10<sup>th</sup>. November, 2022. **Total project costs amount to €17,989,387. RRDF grant approved is €14,391,509.** 



Activating Cahir's Town Centre Regeneration Strategy This project follows on from the successful Category 2 RRDF application for the planning and design of a new Business Development Centre in the heart of Cahir, public realm enhancements in the centre of the town and the development of a car park on a central backland site. Improvements will consist of (i) the restoration and redevelopment of the vacant Cahir Market House and former Council Offices into a Business

Development Centre which will be run by Cahir Development Association and provide offices, a large training and conference room, co-working spaces and hot desks to satisfy the unmet demand in the town (ii) the refurbishment of the historic Granary building to provide a state-of -the-art library for the community; (iii) Cahir Square Public Realm Enhancements to include the recalibration of the traffic



circulating around the Square to a more rationalised flow that prioritises pedestrian and cyclist movements and the redistribution of public realm in favour of recreational space; (iv) the provision of



a new car park consisting of 86 car parking spaces, coach parking, EV charging, and bicycle parking on disused backlands off Church Street which will involve the demolition of two derelict vacant buildings that were acquired by the Council under the Category 2 approved project. Funding was announced by Minister Heather Humphreys under Phase 2 on 10<sup>th</sup>. November, 2022. **Total project costs amount to €14,894,686. RRDF grant approved is €11,915,749.** 

### Reimaging and Regenerating Gantly Street – Towards an Age Friendly Neighbourhood for Roscrea

This project will deliver a transformational change to the public space around Gantly Road and promote regeneration of town centre brownfield land through the activation of the surrounding lands. The project will be the catalyst and first phase in the implementation of the Gantly Street Age



Friendly Neighbourhood, an ambitious masterplan to create a more vibrant and appealing place for people of all ages to address specific social, environmental and economic challenges within the community. The works will involve (i) the realignment of Gantly Street to provide for improved pedestrian and cycle infrastructure in accordance with Age Friendly principles; (ii) the creation of high-quality public realm areas and footpaths; (iii) extensive bio-retention rain gardens and (iv) the provision of water

service and utilities infrastructure to service the Gantly Road Age Friendly Masterplan area. The regeneration and re-imaging of Gantly Street is critical to the overall delivery of the Gantly Street Age Friendly Neighbourhood masterplan area into the future. Development of the Gantly Street masterplan area will transform a central area of Roscrea, create opportunities to provide homes, business and amenity space for local residents to enjoy and lead to knock-on socio-economic benefits for the whole of the town. Funding was announced by Minister Heather Humphreys under Phase 2 on 10<sup>th</sup>. November, 2022. **Total project costs amount to €5,639,145. RRDF grant approved is €4,511,316.** 

#### **Conservation Grant Schemes 2023**

The **Built Heritage Investment Scheme 2023** sought to encourage conservation of structures protected under the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as amended) and in certain cases, structures within Architectural Conservation Areas.

Due to price inflation and the difficulties in securing skilled trades people a number of projects were unable to proceed this year. However, Tipperary County Council was able to reallocate this funding to the projects that did proceed using our full allocation of €126,400 under the BHIS and €21,377 under the Ring Fenced Thatch Funding. The following grants were paid out in October and we are now in the process recouping funds from the Department of Housing, Heritage and Local Government.



#### **E-Planning**

In association with the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage (DHLGH), and the Local Government Management Agency (LGMA), Tipperary Planning Authority has successfully completed the pilot of phase one, two and three of planning portal https://planning.localgov.ie. During our first full year live on the planning portal over 50% of applications were received online. Set out below are the monthly figures % of E- applications received by month for 2022 and 2023 in Tipperary. From January to Oct inclusive 2023 53% of submissions received, were received via the portal. Work is continuing with the LGMA and our third-party providers and part 8 applications are now online with 14 from Tipperary currently on the planning portal in 2022 & 2023. Nationally at the time of writing we have now assisted the following planning authorities to go live: Carlow, Cavan, Clare, Galway County, Galway City, Kerry, Kildare, Kilkenny, Laois, Leitrim, Limerick, Longford, Louth, Mayo, Meath, Monaghan, Offaly, Roscommon, Sligo, Waterford, Westmeath and Wicklow and. It is planned that the remaining iPlan authority will go live in 2023 and the Apas/Odyssey planning authorities also. Tipperay's role as a pilot county has now ceased.





#### **Planning & Emergency Services SPC**

The third and fourth meetings of the Planning & Emergency Services SPC for 2023 was held on 12<sup>th</sup> September and 1<sup>st</sup> November 2023. Updates were given on Residential Zoned Land Tax, Emergency Services, Temporary Time-Limited Waiver of Development Contributions Department Circulars, Local Area Plans and Town Centre First. The next meeting is due to be held in January 2024.



#### Major Emergency Management

On the 10<sup>th</sup> of October this year a Major Emergency Exercise was held in conjunction with the Principal Response Agencies (An Garda Síochána, Health Service Executive and Tipperary Local Authority) The purpose of the exercise was to test of the External Emergency Plan for Merck, Sharpe & Dohme (Ireland) Ballydine Co Tipperary under the requirements of SI 209 of 2015 (to exercise Seveso sites every 3 years)

#### Exercise Objectives

- To test the External Emergency Plan for MSD
- To familiarise participants with the arrangements contained within the External Emergency Plan including the location of Access Points, Meeting Points, Holding Area and Traffic Control Points
- To test communication links between agencies and site operator
- To practice onsite co-ordination and information management systems within the Major Emergency framework



The format of the exercise was a live rollout testing the handover procedure from MSD and the PRA's and the onsite coordination functions of the PRA's.

In total, 30 people attended the exercise including several MSD (Ireland). These exercises play an




important role in MEM, not only under our Seveso obligations but also as a familiarisation on-site by our first responders during the lead-up to the exercise. It also proves to be an excellent networking opportunity for all involved, ensuring if an actual emergency were to be declared the response would be a highly efficient coordinated one.



#### Upgrade of Breathing Apparatus Burn house- A greener approach to realistic fire training

Over the past year and a half Tipperary Fire & Rescue Servers has invested considerable time and effort into developing a cleaner greener more environmentally friendly approach to training firefighters. The fruition of these efforts has come in a department-funded project, which allowed us to upgrade our existing 'Burnhouse' to a fully gas-burning facility.

In the past we relied on the burning of wood pallets to achieve the temperatures and humidity required for realistic training, however, with this innovative gas set-up, we can achieve the same



instructors an enhanced learning experience.

results using a gas pocket fire system. Among other benefits, this system sees 3.5 times less C02 being released into the atmosphere than would typically be expected from wood burning. It also greatly reduces any health and safety risks encountered by other training centres.

Initial feedback from instructors using the facility has been very positive with one Fire Service even remarking that "they would now, not train anywhere else, it ticks all our boxes"

The gas system is complemented by ducted smoke and attack fire panels to allow recruits to experience a smoke-filled environment without any of the associated risks. We are confident that the upgrade to our burn-house offers both students and


### **Civil Defence**

Ukrainian Displaced Persons Response	Tipperary Civil Defence continues to provide ongoing support to both rest centers in Clonmel and Littleton predominately with the provision of transport to medical appointment, ENTRO offices and other essential and emergency services. Volunteers and staff also provide first aid and medical assistance at both centers Civil Defence is still providing ongoing assistance to Housing section in the movement of residence to more permanent accommodation. #### <u>Arts Service</u> <u>Culture Night</u>

Culture Night Tipperary 2023 attracted an audience of nearly 3000 people on the evening of Friday, September 22<sup>nd</sup>, while also engaging the participation of up to 70 artists and creative practitioners. Collaborating closely with our arts and cultural partners, we developed and coordinated 40 events, across 13 towns and villages. Tipperary came alive with a vibrant programme of live performances, exhibitions, workshops, tours, screenings and community events. Events were held in Clonmel, Nenagh, Carrick on Suir, Cahir, Fethard, Borrisokane, Thurles, Tipperary Town, Cloughjordan, Cashel, Roscrea, Newport, Terryglass and Ballina. As in previous years, the main objective was to shine a spotlight on the many creative initiatives happening across Tipperary, with the aim of motivating new and existing audiences to actively participate in the arts in their area and return to those same cultural venues for subsequent engagement. Audiences were welcomed to Culture Night Late in the Ballroom at Hearn's Hotel Clonmel, presented by Clonmel Applefest, supported by the new Culture Night Late funding strand. This event was a vibrant celebration of music, storytelling and dance. The evening featured a captivating journey through Irish mythology with Orla McGovern's storytelling, a delightful blend of waltzes, tango and gypsy jazz by the jazz/klezmer band Fresh Air Collective, and a mesmerizing display of artistic skill by the hula hoop fire dancers, Stevie and Ro.

Tipperary Town saw an increase in Culture Night activity this year with the addition of the newly established 6s & 7s Gallery and the Creative Places programme. Artist Gerry Carew, opened the 6s & 7s gallery in early 2023 and for Culture Night invited the community to explore her gallery and participate in workshops. Creative Places Tipperary Town collaborated with the Irish wheelchair association to capture the experiences of wheelchair users living in Tipperary Town, through the mediums of song and visual art. Furthermore, we found ways to celebrate the diversity of culture in Tipperary again this year. We showcased the 'Sunflowers' Soniashnyk' exhibition, curated by artist Trish Taylor Thompson in Terryglass. This exhibition was a tribute to the Ukrainian national flower and was developed in collaboration with the Ukrainian communities in North Tipperary. In addition, Down Syndrome Tipperary enjoyed a joyous celebration of Down Syndrome Culture in their headquarters in Thurles. We also supported The Clonmel Theatre Guild who staged a rehearsed reading of the original comedy play 'Sacred Old Cow' at the Coachman in Clonmel. This production brought together both Irish and Indian actors, promoting cultural exchange.

• Switch 'The Videos in the Windows' made a return to Nenagh this year, featuring a diverse ensemble of international artists. Among the contributing talents were Cecilia Stenbom [UK], Bob Bicknell-Knight

The participating writer this year was Nigel Quinlan [Cloughjordan]. From October 29<sup>th</sup> to November 5<sup>th</sup>, the collective works of the 'Switch' artists melded into the town's daily fabric, transforming the landscape from 4pm -11pm in Nenagh. These video pieces served as a temporary intervention, offering a unique perspective that diverged from the usual rhythms of the town. Printed copies of the 'little yellow book' containing the full programme of featured works were available to the public. Copies were available at Nenagh Arts Centre, Nenagh Library and other locations throughout Nenagh town. Harald Turek, the lead artist and driving force behind the project, facilitated two open and free "switching on" walking tours this year. These tours provided audiences with an opportunity to hear more about the project and each of the individual works.

#### **Tipperary Youth Arts Hub**

 Artists and youth workers from Tipperary actively participated in two Youth Arts Hub Tipperary events this autumn. The first event took place on Thursday, October 19<sup>th</sup> in Cashel. Led by Dave Kelly, the national training coordinator for Youth Theatre Ireland, the Creative Drama Approaches full-day workshop delved into a toolkit of facilitation techniques and activities for youth drama, specifically tailored for work with young people.

Subsequently, artist and youth workers from Tipperary attended the Tipperary Youth Arts Hub Story Exchange training event on Tuesday, November 21<sup>st</sup> in Thurles. Visual artist Natalie El Baba led this distinctive training event, blending storytelling with visual art to foster empathy and establish meaningful connections. The workshop was designed to equip youth workers and artists with practical tools and techniques applicable in their work with young people, placing a particular emphasis on empathy and relationship building. The Tipperary Youth Arts Hub aims to advance skills development, practice exchange and networking for youth workers, youth arts practitioners and artists involved in youth arts in Tipperary. It is a partnership initiative that strives to strengthen the community of youth arts practice in Tipperary and better support youth arts provision locally in non-formal education and youth work settlings. Partners include Tipperary ETB, Tipperary Arts Office, Youth Work Ireland Tipperary and NYCI's National Youth Arts programme.



#### **COMMERCIAL RATES**

Rate Accruals for 2023 amounted to €36,839,065.

Arrears of €5,921,516 were brought forward from 2022, giving the total amount to be collected as €42,760,581.

This has been adjusted downwards in the amount of €392,796, following decisions on appeals to the Valuation Tribunal following ReVal 2019. Further reductions may follow as other appeals are decided.

Write offs in the amount of €838,939 have been processed to end October 2023.

Receipts of €30,737,558, (74%), were recorded to 31/10/2023.

#### EARLY PAYMENT SCHEME FOR COMMERCIAL RATES

1,941 customers have availed of the Early Payment Scheme in 2023.

Reductions of €320,368 were achieved.

The terms for our Early Payment Scheme for 2023 are: -

- Applied to all rate payers with an annual rates bill of up to  $\pounds$ 26,000.
- To avail of the Early Payment Reduction of 6%, subject to a maximum of €600, payment of rates must be made in full, by 31st July 2023.
- Customers paying by Direct Debit can avail of the scheme if payment is made by September 2022.

The scheme is open to customers with arrears on their accounts where they meet the following requirements:

a) Pay a minimum amount which is equivalent to the annual rates by the same timelines outlined above and

b) Enter into a structured payment plan to address and eliminate arrears.

# Final figures for the EPS for 2023 are not finalised yet as we have a small number of customers on payment plans who may yet qualify



#### VACANT PROPERTY RELIEF

Commercial Rates remain payable on vacant property. Where a property is vacant on the date of making the rate, owners must notify the local authority and advise that the property is vacant and for letting, or is closed for refurbishment or repair.

Vacancy relief will be applied to qualifying property in accordance with the following scale:

Category	% Relief/Payment		
Qualified Vacant Properties with a rates bill up to €5,000	100% Vacancy Relief		
Qualified Vacant Properties with a rates bill over €5,000, but less than €10,000	80% Vacancy Relief 20% to be paid		
Qualified Vacant Properties with a rates bill over €10,000	60% Vacancy Relief 40% to be paid
