Item 3.5
Flood Risk
Management
Plans

Mr. Marcus O'Connor, Director of Services, referred to the reports circulated with the agenda in relation to the Flood Risk Management Plans for the Shannon, Suir and Nore rivers, prepared under the National CFRAM Programme and in particular the recommendation contained therein in relation to County Tipperary and introduced Mr. Gerry Gallagher of the OPW Flood Risk and Management Section.

Mr. Gerry Gallagher in his presentation to the Council noted that the OPW was leading a proactive response to flooding in Ireland and the Flood Risk Management Plans set out measures to address flood risk. The OPW, through its CFRAM programme carried out the largest ever flood risk study in Ireland to date, undertaking a detailed engineering assessment of over 300 areas or communities believed to be at significant flood risk, of which 90 are coastal. The study assessed 80% of properties at risk from Ireland's main causes of flooding and was informed by public consultation at each stage.

He stated that the key outputs of the CFRAM Programme were:-

- 40,000 flood maps showing the flood risk for 300 communities that support planning decisions and emergency response
- 29 Flood Risk Management Plans to cover the whole country, with the proposed flood relief measures informed by cost, benefits and environmental factors, to address the flood risk in each community and nationwide.

The plans were informed by associated Strategic, Environmental and Habitats Directive (Appropriate) Assessments. The draft plan was presented to the members on the 12th September, 2016.

He highlighted the main findings in the flood plans that 34,500 properties had 1% chance of a significant flood in any year and 95% of these can be protected against that flood with flood relief schemes. He noted that 42 schemes were complete, which included Carrick-on-Suir, Clonmel, Mullinahone and Newport in Tipperary representing 678 properties costs €55.1m, 33 schemes were underway including Templemore in Tipperary representing 109 properties and costing €10.2m and 118 schemes identified in the plans, protecting 11,500 properties of which 12 were proposed for Tipperary covering 290 properties, costing €17.5m.

In relation to the proposed schemes, he noted that five were progressing to detailed design and a further seven schemes would be delivered by OPW and local authorities over 10 year programme making use of available capacity.

He referred to a new website www.floodinfo.ie which provided access to the plans and maps developed by the OPW and information on flood risk management in Ireland. The interactive flood plan review allowed users to view a summary of the flood risk management measures as set out in the plans and also allowed users to access flood mapping data for the areas assessed. He encouraged members to become familiar with the website.

Members while welcoming the presentation queried about issues in their respective areas which were responded to as follows by Mr. Marcus O'Connor, Director of Services and Mr. Gerry Gallagher, OPW.

Thurles and Golden Flood Alleviation Works – Flood defences for Thurles and Golden were included in the plan and detailed design plans would be prepared. Members concerns

regarding the timescale for these projects were noted

Templemore (River Mall) – Works had commenced on this scheme.

Marlfield – An application for flood relief works at this location had been made to the Office of Public Works.

Carrick-on-Suir – Works had been carried out to pumps and culverts at the Pumping Station on the N.24. A detailed report was awaited from the OPW on the issues that caused the failure of the pumping station at this location and resulted in severe flooding in December, 2015.

Carrigahorig Anglers Rest – works would be carried out at this location as part of a scheme being funded by the T.I.I. (Transport Infrastructure Ireland). It was noted that riparian owners were responsible for certain river channels and the OPW were currently working to provide advice to owners in this regard.

Water Quality– this was a matter for LAWCO and the River Basin Districts

Climate Change – Allowances had been made in the plans for Climate Change.

Property Insurance in Flood Risk Areas – This was a matter for the Minister for Finance and the Insurance Federation to progress. It was not within the remit of the OPW but it was noted that discussions had taken place with the relevant Minister in this regard. It was noted that there was a memorandum of understanding in place where schemes had been completed.

Members had been circulated with the River Shannon, River Suir and River Nore Flood Risk Management Plans for consideration and adoption.

Members indicated their support of the plans and following discussion and consideration it was proposed by **Cllr. M. FitzGerald**, seconded by **Cllr. S. Hanafin** and resolved

“That, pursuant to the provisions of Article 20 of the European Communities (Assessment and Management of Flood Risks) Regulations 2010 and having examined and considered the River Shannon Upper and Lower and estuary Flood Risk Management Plans (FRMPs) the Council hereby resolve to adopt the Plan”.

“That, pursuant to the provisions of Article 20 of the European Communities (Assessment and Management of Flood Risks) Regulations 2010 and having examined and considered the River Suir Flood Risk Management Plan (FRMP) the Council hereby resolve to adopt the Plan”.

“That, pursuant to the provisions of Article 20 of the European Communities (Assessment and Management of Flood Risks) Regulations 2010 and having examined and considered the River Nore and River Blackwater Flood Risk Management Plans (FRMPs) the Council hereby resolve to adopt the Plan”.

The Chief Executive Mr. Joe MacGrath noted the importance of the adoption of the plans for the County and thanked the OPW and the members for their input into the process, noting the members concerns in relation to the timeframes for completion of some of the schemes.

Item 3.6

Draft County Tipperary Digital Strategy 2018-

Mr. Pat Slattery referred to the County Tipperary Digital Strategy 2018-2023 which had been circulated to the members for their consideration. Building on strategies put together nationally, the digital strategy for County Tipperary had been developed around four themes, Infrastructure, Enterprise, Citizens and Training and Education. The strategy was the result of

comprehensive research and consultation. The Strategy set out the objectives to enhance the digital economy in Tipperary and the actions required to achieve the objectives including the development of hubs/hotspots.

Proposed by **Cllr. MI Murphy** seconded **Cllr. J. Ryan** and resolved

“In accordance with National Digital Strategy for Ireland 2013, Ireland’s Broadband Intervention Strategy - Connecting Communities 2015, the Draft Local Government ICT Strategy 2017-2022, and The Department of Communications, Climate Change and Environment’s Statement of Strategy 2016-2019, and having examined the digital profile prepared for County Tipperary and a plan of action with emphasis on infrastructure as issues pertaining to enterprises, citizens and Training and Education, the Council hereby resolve to adopt the County Tipperary Digital Strategy 2018-2023”.

Members welcomed the Strategy stressing the importance of high speed broadband for businesses in the County and noting the critical role that education and enterprise will play.

Members acknowledged the contribution of the PPN members to the LCDC process.

Item 5.1

Consideration of Management Report

The Management Report with a focus on directorates based in Nenagh as circulated with the Agenda was noted and considered by the Council. The following issues were raised:-

Differential Rent Harmonisation Process

With the permission of the Cathaoirleach, Cllr. S. Morris raised concerns he had with the Differential Rent Harmonisation process recently notified to tenants.

It was noted that a workshop had been held with members regarding the amalgamation of the nine different schemes across the county into one Scheme for the County of Tipperary.

Tenants were notified of the review and of their new rent in advance of the charge becoming due. The making of a Rent Scheme was an executive function.

Cllr. Morris expressed his shock at the level of increase in some tenants rent and took issue with tenants who were expressing difficulties in meeting the revised rent being asked to discuss their financial problems with MABS.

A number of members supported Cllr. Morris and asked for a deferral of the new Rent Scheme. Queries were raised regarding the types of household income being taken into account, the level of repairs that the Council were responsible for and the proposals for income generated by the new scheme.

Ms. S. Carr, Director of Services, in response, stated that the aim of the revised scheme was to give equity and parity across the County. Rent Schemes in the eight adjoining counties had been examined and Tipperary had the lowest rent in respect of the Minimum Rent applicable and a Maximum Rent was applied. 17.5% of income was the maximum a tenant would pay, whereas the country wide average was 30%. All rents were based on nett income and those tenants who had received a significant increase would have had a change in circumstances since their previous rent review.

Reference was made to a national rent scheme as provided for in the Local Government Reform Act, 2014, however this part of the Act had not been implemented to date.

It was noted that 22% of tenants had no impact as a result of the harmonisation process, 60% were affected by an increase of between €10-€20 and 3% were affected by a €50 increase which arose as a result of a change in the financial circumstances of the household

The Council had an arrangement with MABS prior to the Rent Review whereby tenants in difficulty with rent payments could be referred to MABS for a comprehensive review of all the family finances. This had proven to be beneficial to families to enable them meet their financial commitments. All tenants were encouraged to engage with the Council to discuss rent issues and staff were available to meet with them.

The Tenant Handbook relating to repairs to council dwellings was being re-examined in consultation with the Strategic Policy Committee. It was also clarified that all additional income generated by the Rent Scheme would be ring fenced for housing maintenance related purposes.

It was noted that an error had occurred in the notification of the scheme to a certain amount of tenants in the Roscrea area but this error had been rectified and tenants affected would be afforded the same opportunity to consider their circumstances as all other tenants.

Cllr. Morris reiterated his opposition to the Rent Scheme and proposed a deferral of its implementation. This proposal was seconded by Cllr Pat English

Mr. Joe MacGrath, Chief Executive, confirmed to the members that review of rents was an executive function and therefore the proposal to defer the scheme was not lawful. He had listed carefully to the members concerns and complimented the Director of Services who had given an honest and factual explanation of the procedure that was followed in the implementation of the review and harmonisation of the Rent Schemes. He stressed that empathy and equity was always applied to cases presented to the Housing Section. He asked the members to work with him to implement the new scheme which was necessary to ensure that all tenants in Tipperary were being assessed equally and under one scheme. The Rent Scheme was favourable in comparison with neighbouring authorities. Rent assessment in the private sector was based on the market value of the dwelling whereas in local authorities it was based on income. He committed to having resources available for tenants to discuss rent issues with staff in the Housing Section and that all rent issues would be dealt with on a case by case basis. He urged members to discuss any cases they had with officials so that assessments could be clarified for the tenant.

In protest Cllr. S. Morris and Cllr. P. English left the meeting in an orderly fashion, expressing their disappointment and opposition to the new scheme.

Roads, Transportation, Health & Safety

C.I.S/L.I.S Schemes – Members referred to the contributions payable by communities under these schemes and the short timeframe allowed to meet their commitment. It was noted that every effort was made to accommodate communities having regard to the timeframes imposed on the local authority as notified by the Department of Transport. It was noted that works cannot commence until the contributions are paid.

Litter on Roadside Verge – a particular case of littering in the Clonmel Borough District would be raised with the District Engineer.

Hedge cutting on Secondary Roads - issues raised by members regarding responsibility for hedge cutting on secondary roads would be considered by the Roads & Transportation Strategic Policy Committee

Regional Signs Ballina Area - Signage in the Ballina area would be examined to ensure foliage was not causing visibility issues.

Tarmacdam – it was noted that tarmacadam on certain areas of road surface was softening in the current spell of hot weather and this would be monitored.

Speed Limit Signs N24 Clonmel to Carrick-onSuir. – all required speed limit signage would be in place within the coming weeks.

Ballycahane Road, Tipperary – Matter to be followed up with the Municipal District.

N.24 Davitt Street, Tipperary – It was anticipated that Pavement Strengthening Works at Davitt Street, Tipperary would commence in September, 2018, but works would not be completed before the end of the year.

E-Parking - E Parking was being used in nine towns in the County and a further media promotion would take place in the Autumn.

Ring Road, Thurles – Members expressed their grave concerns that the development of a ring road for Thurles was not included in the National Development Plan and funding had not been designated. It was noted that the Link Road was a separate scheme to the Inner Relief Road and land ownership issues were still outstanding in relation to the Link Road Scheme. It was agreed that the concerns of the members regarding the Ring Road would be brought to the attention of the TII.

CCTV Littleton – It was agreed to pursue clarity from AGS concerning the data controller for CCTV systems.

Road Opening Licences - The charges for a Road Opening Licence varied dependant on the size of the opening and the type of road surface requiring repair. A scale of charges would be forwarded to Cllr Marie Murphy as requested.

Road Alignment, Lattragh – The matter was at design stage awaiting approval. It was also noted that smaller chippings had been applied to the Lattragh bends to increase traction.

Potholes – Insurance Claims It was noted that all claims were investigated and decided on by Irish Public Bodies, the Councils Insurers.

Shannon Crossing It was noted that consultants were appointed and anticipated to proceed to tender stage in 2019.

Planning

Regional and Spatial Economic Strategy – It was noted that formal consideration of the RSES would take place in September by the Regional Assembly. Members had been emailed a roadmap giving revised population targets for the southern region and these targets allowed for adequate growth over the review of the National Development Plan.

Fire & Emergency Services

Water Shortages – It was confirmed that in the current dry spell, the Fire Services had adequate water supply available to them and were extracting their supplies from rivers and streams and not impacting on the public supplies.

Templemore Fire Station - it was noted that the Council had to re-tender the contract following the previous contractor going into liquidation. This involved a two stage tendering process and it was anticipated to issue tenders to pre-qualified contractors as part of Stage 2 shortly.

Library & Cultural Service

It was agreed on the proposal of the Cathaoirleach to take Item 8.2, Notice of Motion 1409 as part of the Management Report on Library & Cultural Service.

Commemoration to mark the Centenary of First Dáil

The Motion was seconded by **Cllr. D. Doran**

The reply to Notice of Motion was noted as follows:-

The expert advisory committee of the Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, sought submissions from the Local Authorities earlier this year in relation to the decade of commemorations. Tipperary County Council submitted a proposal stressing the importance of local communities in this process and the central role that they will play in the upcoming commemorations. This expert committee is currently considering the direction in which they will go for the remainder of this period of commemoration. A decision is expected in the latter part of 2018 which will set out the proposals for the coming years and the scope and role that Local Authorities will play. This will also determine the funding, if any, that Local Authorities will receive and the manner in which this will be dispersed. Currently, a considerable amount of planning and preparation is taking place amongst a number of community groups and organisations around the county in advance of these centenaries, and a number of queries have been received in relation to funding. During the 2016 celebrations, a sub-committee of the Housing, Community and Culture SPC was formed to oversee the programme. Should the format be similar or remain the same, this type of collaboration can be looked at again and expanded if necessary.

Cllr R. Kennedy expressed his satisfaction with the reply and suggested that the January Meeting of the Council take place on 21st January assuming it did not clash with the National Commemoration. It was also suggested that the Council would consult with the families concerned in relation to their involvement in the County's commemoration.

Tipperary Library

The official opening of the new library premises in Tipperary had taken place and the attendance numbers to date had exceeded expectations. It was noted that the increased book fund for the Library had enabled a new stock of books and visual aids to be provided.

Templemore Library

It was clarified that opening hours did not change in Templemore Library but that Annual Leave for staff during the summer months was affecting certain periods.

It was agreed that a workshop of the members in relation to Budget 2019 would take place at 2.30 p.m. on Friday 31st August, 2018, in the Municipal District Offices in Thurles. This would be preceded by a meeting of the CPG at 1.30 p.m.
